

Soil Conservation Group Has Annual Dinner In Hertford

The Albemarle Soil Conservation District Supervisors held their annual banquet in Hertford last Wednesday night. The banquet has become an annual affair, since the first one was planned and held in 1949 by the President of the Albemarle Soil Conservation Supervisors, Lloyd C. Bunch of Edenton.

After a well served, delicious chicken dinner, an interesting program was carried out. The main speaker of the evening was W. K. Beichler, State Forester, and member of the State Soil Conservation Committee. Mr. Beichler presented some interesting facts and figures relative to the conservation of forests and soils in North Carolina. He pointed out to the group the need for greater control of forest fires—ninety per cent of which are caused by man. He also cited the need for keeping the soils in place by means of either grass or tree roots.

E. B. Garrett, N. C. State Conservationist, made a short talk. Mr. Garrett pictured to those present several instances of outstanding progress

in the agriculture of North Carolina. He said that these achievements did not just happen, but were the results of research in farming.

Lloyd C. Bunch of Chowan County was chairman of the meeting. W. Reginald Gregory, District Forest Ranger and Pasquotank County Soil Conservation Supervisor was Master of ceremonies.

C. D. Fetzer, District Conservationist, assisted by F. A. McGoogan, Soil Conservationist of Perquimans County, helped the Albemarle Supervisors to make arrangements for the occasion.

Attending the meeting from Chowan County were: Lloyd C. Bunch, R. H. Hollowell, and Joe A. Webb, Jr., Chowan County Supervisors; Frank V. White, Chowan Forest Warden; J. M. Price and J. L. Kelton, Production Marketing Administration; C. W. Overman and R. S. Marsh of the North Carolina Extension Service; E. S. White, Vocational Agriculture Teacher; and George Conner, Jr., and R. C. Jordan of the Soil Conservation Service.

The Albemarle Soil Conservation District is composed of Camden, Chowan, Currituck, Pasquotank and Perquimans counties. Supervisors and representatives of the different agencies from each of these counties attended the banquet meeting.

Date Set Up For Driver Examinations

Plans for examinations for persons applying for chauffeur's licenses for the fiscal year 1950-1951 are outlined by the Department of Motor Vehicles.

The more than 40,000 persons who drive vehicles for hire in North Carolina began applying for their new licenses on May 1 this year instead of on May 15, as in the past. Present chauffeur's licenses expire on June 30. Since N through Q drivers must also obtain renewals by that date, the extra two weeks was given chauffeurs to avoid a heavier than usual rush as the deadline nears.

All applicants for chauffeur's licenses will be given an eye test. Persons applying for a chauffeur's li-

ense and not holding a valid operator's license, chauffeurs whose licenses have expired, chauffeurs over 60 years of age, and chauffeurs with disabilities occurring since their last examination will be given complete examinations.
