

Series Of Welfare Meetings Planned

People of North Carolina will get a first-hand report on the state's welfare system in a series of six meet-

ings planned for this fall, it has been announced in Raleigh. At the same time, the people in attendance will have an opportunity to participate in open forum discussions on the administration of the welfare program.

Dr. Ellen Winston, Commissioner of the State Board of Public Welfare has announced that plans had been made for these meetings, which are

held annually. Planning the series were officers of the six districts into which the state is divided for purposes of holding the open discussions of public welfare.

The meetings will be held at Elizabethtown, October 25; Waycross, October 27; Salisbury, October 31; Elkin, November 1; Asheville, November 2; and Tarboro, November 21. Each of the meetings will be open to the public, with county officials, civic and social lay leaders, legislators, and all interested citizens urged to attend.

At each of the meetings, Dr. Winston will speak on legislative needs and will sum up the current status of public welfare activities in this state. Her talk will be preceded by an open forum discussion, led by five discussion leaders to be selected locally, on the general theme of "Strengthening Public Welfare Administration." Meetings will end with an informal luncheon.

There can be no doubt but that the present farm program suffers in the public regard when huge stocks of potatoes and other perishable products are accumulated under conditions that compel the government to take drastic action to prevent complete loss. Some

reasonable plan should be devised to handle perishable farm products on a possible basis.

Obviously, there is a need for a change in method insofar as perishable farm products are concerned, although this is not needed in the handling of products like cotton, tobacco, etc.

During the war, production payments were tried in an effort to prevent the accumulation of surpluses and in order to make ample supplies available to consumers. Just what method can be devised that will be just to both producers and consumers and fair to the public treasury remains to be seen. Just the same, some new approach to the handling of perishable farm products is imperative.

About Your Home

One of the most important things for a home to have is plenty of closet space. Modern home designers realize this and are planning homes accordingly. Women know that closets not only provide protection for certain items but storage space for items not in use and thus prevent clutter about the home.

Closets must be carefully planned in order to get the maximum use from them. Before going to the expense and trouble of tearing down a wall to get more closet space, check to see if existing closet space is being used as efficiently as possible.

Decorations for the closet are matched as carefully as for any room in the home today. Manufacturers are making accessories of all kinds for closets that blend with any color scheme. Accessories may also be made at home quite easily.

There are stocking bags and shoe bags that are inexpensive to buy or to make. If blankets and flat apparel are to be stored in the closet, place them in clear plastic zippered bags or boxes. This way, just a glance will tell where different items are stored. When clear plastic bags are not used for storage, a list of the contents of each box or bag should be made and fastened there-on.

Hats stored on racks or hatters should always be covered with plastic or cloth covers to keep dust from settling on them for the accumulated effect of dust or straw and felt, from
