

Deadline Set For School Insurance

Announcement was made this week by John Biggers that a deadline has been established for county school children desiring to sign up for the blanket coverage insurance being offered Perquimans children through the agency of Mrs. Viola D. Nachman. The deadline for coverage was set as September 25; however, children who have not signed for the insurance may do so after this date but this policy will not be retroactive to the opening of schools.

Two minor accidents have already been reported as occurring on the school grounds this term, and it is understood that the children involved were covered by the insurance program.

It is the hope of the school officials that all parents planning to participate in this program, for their children, will send the policy payment to the child's school by September 25.

No Increase In Welfare Checks

Contrary to reports circulating over the county, there will be no increase in welfare checks issued under Old Age Assistance, it was reported this week by C. Edgar White, Superintendent of Public Welfare.

The idea that old age assistance checks were to be increased, it is believed, came about through an announcement that benefits under social security are to be increased beginning October. There is no connection between the assistance given by the Welfare Department through old age assistance and social security and therefore the increased benefits approved for social security will not affect the Welfare program in any way.

COUNTY GAME WARDEN RELEASES HUNTING DATES

(Continued from Page One) January 1 in all Albemarle counties. There is no bag limit.

Rabbit and squirrel season opens on October 16. Rabbit season closes January 31 and squirrel season will close on January 1.

Open season on rabbits starts on November 23 and closes January 1 with a daily bag limit of five and season limit of 75.

For squirrels the season opens October 16 and closes January 1. Eight daily is the limit and a season limit of 100 squirrels.

Quail season opens November 23 and closes January 31. It has a daily limit of eight, possession of 16 and season limit of 100.

Wild turkey season opens November 23, closes January 31, daily limit of one and season limit of three.

Ruffed grouse opens on November 23, closes January 31, daily limit of two and season limit of 12.

Pheasant season opens October 2 and closes January 10 and no bag limit has been established.

Red and gray fox season is the same as for any other game bird or animal, except that where the county fox laws regulate the season and in such cases the local laws prevail.
