

Indians Lose To Yellow Jackets

A determined band of Perquimans Indians battled the Elizabeth City Yellow Jackets to a standstill, in the annual Thanksgiving Day football game, played at Elizabeth City, but greater manpower was a decided advantage for the Jackets who won the contest by a score of 18-6.

The Indians, who scored the first TD early in the game and took a 6-0 lead, were the superior team during the entire first half. The offensive tactics, led by Walker and Williams, kept the Jackets off balance and early in the first period Perquimans scored on a 12-yard pass from Walker to Thatch. The try for extra point failed.

Perquimans stayed in the Elizabeth

City territory most of the first half and Elizabeth City appeared to have trouble matching the spirit of the Indians. Defensive play of Clinton Winslow, A. T. Lane and Clarence Shackelford prevented Elizabeth City from making any definite threats to the Perquimans goal line.

At half time Perquimans led by a score of six to nothing.

Elizabeth City received the opening kick off in the third quarter, and the Jackets looked like a different team. Chalking up four first downs, the Jackets marched from their own 45-yard line for a TD to tie the score at 6-6. The remainder of this quarter was an evenly matched battle between the two teams each seeking an opening in the other's defense.

Early in the fourth quarter the Jackets received a break when they intercepted an Indian pass, to stall a Perquimans march for a TD, this pass interception was run back to the Perquimans 3-yard line and on a line play the Jackets scored to take a 12-6 lead. Elizabeth City scored its third TD with two minutes remaining in the ball game, by driving 25 yards on a series of line plays.

Perquimans tallied four first downs while Elizabeth City had 10.

Heavy Loss In Thanksgiving Fire

A fire of undetermined origin, which was discovered at about 2:30 o'clock Thanksgiving morning caused property loss of about \$5,000. The fire started in a small garage on King Street, operated by William Felton, Negro, and spread to houses owned by Felton and Lee Hinton.

Firemen, on their arrival at the scene, found the blaze had gained considerable headway, and the firemen attempted to prevent the blaze from enveloping the neighboring homes, however, gasoline explosions, from two cars in the garage one between the garage and the Felton home added to the inferno. The Fire Department extinguished the fire in one hour and a half.

The Hinton house which was partially covered by insurance had considerable damage, while Felton's house and garage, along with the three cars, were totally lost.
