United Nations troops in North Korea have retreated during the past week from near the Manchurian border to a defense line located just north of the 38th Parallel. Chinese Communists reportedly more than 1,000,000 tstrong, are continuing a strong attack against the UN forces. A report Wednesday related some 30,000 U. S. troops were trapped near the port of Wonson. Top Army officials stated Wednesday it was their belief the U. S. Eighth Army will hold the defense line now being prepared.
