Bishop Waters Appoints F. J. McCourt Diocesan Director Of N. O. D. L.

The Most Reverend Vincent S. Waters, Bishop of Raleigh, appointed Rev. F. J. McCourt, pastor of the Edenton Catholic Parish, Diocesan Director of National Organization for Decent Literature, effective January 15. On same date, a new parish will be formed, embracing all of Martin County (including Williamston) formerly included in the territory of St. Agnes' Parish, Washington, N. C., all of Washington County except N. E. portion included by Routes 32 and 64, Bertie County Townships Whites and Merry Hill, the two latter areas hitherto included in St. Ann's Missionary Parish.

Father McCourt will continue to be rector of the Edenton Parish, which on January 15 will be limited to all of Chowan, Tyrrell, Perquimans, Gates counties and above-mentioned portion of Washington County, making his headquarters and residing in Edenton Rectory, as heretofore. As the Church has no property in limits of new parish, Rev. Thomas A. Williams, now pastor of Holy Trinity Church, Kingston, on January 15 will be in residence at St. Ann's Rectory and care for new parish in Williamston and the Stations of Plymouth and Windsor.

Farm Price Rise Expected In 1951

Prices received by Tar Heel farmers will average about 10 per cent higher in 1951 than in 1950, believe specialists of the State College Extension Service.

The statement is contained in an ag-

ricultural outlook summary which is being distributed to farm agents in all of the State's 100 counties. The conclusions given in the summary are based on data provided by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

According to the summary, production costs will be higher in 1951. Taxes will be higher. Farm labor is expected to be higher in price and more difficult to obtain. Supplies of feed, fertilizer, and farm equipment appear to be adequate but likely to be higher in cost and more difficult to get at critical times. Supplies of some pesticides may be short and prices materially higher.

With no extremes of weather, the volume of farm marketings will increase. The expected higher production, selling at a higher price and produced at a higher cost, should yield net incomes to farm operators about 15 per cent above the level of 1950. Family living costs will be higher but the real income or purchasing power of farm families will be improved

over the last two years. The specialists point out that strong inflationary pressures continue to operate in the general economy. Since the Korean incident began last June, the index of prices received by farmers has advanced 8.5 per cent. Likewise the index of prices paid by farmers in October, 1950, was up 7 per cent from a year ago.

The outlook statement is based on the assumption of neither a full war mobilization nor a complete turnabout in the cold war toward world peace and disarmament.
