

## Self-Employed Now Covered By Social Security Rules

Perhaps in the past you have said, or have heard someone say: "John H. was a corporation official with an upper-brackets salary. Now he's retired and getting social security benefit payments monthly. I have my own business and make a modest income. When I retire, my income stops. I don't come under social security."

That statement, made before the 1950 amendments to the Social Security Act, would have been wholly true. However, under the new law, and beginning in January 1951, the self-employed will have social security protection which provides monthly payments to persons 65 years old and over and to survivors of deceased persons.

The self-employed — people who work for themselves may begin building toward old-age and survivors insurance on the first of the year. They, like the salaried worker, may get monthly insurance payments when they retire; their families may get survivors' insurance if the self-employer worker should die.

The self-employed person will be covered by social security if his net earnings are at least \$400 in a year. He will be given a quarter of coverage for each \$100 of his yearly earnings but not more than four quarters of coverage can be credited to any one year.

The self-employed person (who is in effect both employee and employer) will pay a social security tax of 2 1/2% of his net earnings where the amount is \$400 or more in a year, beginning with his net earnings for 1951. He will not pay on earnings of over \$3,600 a year. His first report for social security purposes of his earnings from part of his income-tax return filed on January 1 or March 15, 1952.

This report of his net earnings over \$400 and up to \$3,600 will include any profit from his business operations (as sole owner or partner) but will not include income from such non-business sources as rentals from real estate, unless he is a real estate dealer, or dividends or interest from stocks or bonds, unless he is in the business of securities exchange. Capital gains and losses, and income from an estate or trust will not be considered as earnings for social security purposes.

The kinds of trades and business enterprises in which self-employment will count toward old-age and survivors insurance benefits are varied. As sole owner or partner, you may operate a store, a beauty parlor or a filling station. You may have a barber shop, a tavern, or operate your own taxi. You may be self-employed in your own manufacturing plant, or you may have a shoeshine stand. The size of your business is not a consideration. Again, you may be a free-lance writer, artist, sign painter or independent contractor.

To determine more quickly whether your self-employment work will come under social security in January, scan the following list of excluded professions and business operations. Your earnings will not be covered by the law if they come from self-employment as a physician, dentist, osteopath, chiropractor, optometrist, naturopath, Christian Science practitioner, veterinarian, funeral director, lawyer, as a certified, licensed, registered or full-time practicing accountant, or a professional engineer or architect. Farm operators also, are not covered by social security.

If you are interested in more specific information on whether the new provisions about self-employment affect you, contact your Social Security Office in the Flatiron Building, Norfolk, Va., or the Collector of Internal Revenue, Greensboro, N. C. A representative from each of these offices in regularly in this area.

### Civil Service Exams Called For Positions

The Civil Service Commission is conducting examinations to fill vacancies in expanding defense agencies in Washington, D. C., and vicinity.

Age limits are from 18 to 62. Salaries range from \$2,450 through \$2,875 per annum with periodic increases to \$3,355.

Typists must be able to type accurately at a rate of approximately 42 words per minute. In addition, stenographers must be able to make accurate transcription of dictation given at a rate of approximately 80 words per minute. No practical experience is required.

Promotion opportunities are good for employees who show ability to assume the responsibilities of higher-level jobs.

Government employees are given 26 days of vacation each year and sick-leave credit which may be earned at the rate of 15 days a year.

## Excess Profits Out of War

The Government of the United States is now busy making contracts with industrial concerns for the production of weapons and other items needed in the defense of this country.

Just as in 1939 and 1940, the Government discovers that industries are not so anxious for governmental contracts and that it is the habit of many industries to "hold up" the Government for exorbitant profits. In the emergency that existed prior to World War II, industrial leaders exacted their tribute from the nation and no one yet knows the amazing profits made by industries in connection with our war effort.

It is perfectly natural, perhaps, for industrial geniuses to look with delightful anticipation upon the prospect of fat profits in connection with our present emergency. Only simple-minded Americans will believe that the Government does not pay-through-the-nose for the products of industry whenever it gets in a jam and needs the immediate production of defense items.

After World War I, there was an investigation into the profits of those who manufactured the material of warfare. The people of the country were astounded at the profits of the munitions-makers and others and their disgust at the green of American industry was largely responsible for the wave of isolationism which swept over the nation.

No similar investigation has been conducted into the profits of American industry in the operations of World War II. Newspaper associations and radio commentators rarely call attention to the astronomical profits that industry exacts from government in connection with the manufacture of war necessities. Nevertheless, the cost of defending America is greatly enhanced by exorbitant and excessive profits that industry exacts in connection with assisting in the defense of the United States.

We see no reason why the government of this country, when it is calling young men to the colors, to die in defense of the nation, should not require industry, which includes corporations and individuals, to make a contribution to the defense of the nation. After all, the existence of the United States means the protection of the industry that enjoys fat profits in a land of plenty. There is no excuse for corporations and individuals, in times of national emergency, to make greater profits than are normal in the course of peace-time years.
