MINUTES OF MEETING BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education met in regular session on Monday, March 5, 1951 at 9:30 A. M. Mrs. Mary G. Brinn was absent. Chairman J. A. White presided.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

The legislative program, as it affects Perquimans County Schools was discussed at length. Representative C. R. Holmes discussed with the Board progress being made by the General Assembly and assured the Board that he would support legislation in the interest of public schools.

Progress of the building program was discussed.

The superintendent reported that \$167,000.00 of state funds had been spent to date on the Winfall Negro Union School. He also stated that the remaining \$33,000.00 of state funds would be exhausted by the April 1 payroll, thus requiring county funds to meet the May 1 payroll. This was reported to the County Commissioners by J. A. White, Mrs. Mable Cook, and J. T. Biggers.

A letter from the Hertford High School PTA asking the Board of Education to examine the problem of absenteeism in the school was read. The

superintendent was authorized to investigate and report at the next meeting.
