General Info

A good lawn, well kept, is a beautiful thing, and is an asset to any property. This is not the proper season to plant lawn grasses—except Bermuda grass—but from now on through hot weather is the critical period in lawn maintenance. Fertilization in the spring is not enough to last all summer. A lawn should be fertilized every five or six weeks throughout the growing season. For this summer fertilization use five pounds of nitrate of soda per 1,000 square feet applied while the grass is dry and preferably just before a rain.

Watering is very important. Soak the soil thoroughly at least once a week during dry weather rather than making light sprinklings each day.

Frequent cutting is desirable, but close cutting will do much harm to the better grasses such as Kentucky blue grass.

If you have a good stand of grass, weeds will not thrive, but if weeds have become established, a spray of 2,4-D will also kill your shrubs and flowers, so it must be used with care. Even the spray mist carried by wind may cause a lot of damage. There are also sprays that will kill out crab grass without harming the principal lawn grasses.

Spring flowering shrubs should be pruned as soon as they are through blooming. This group includes such shrubs as spirea, Forsythia, pearl hugh, flowering quince, and others. The main stems may be cut back to new shoot growth and some of the older unproductive stems should be removed. Most of next year's flowers will be on young wood.

Shrubs which bloom in June or later should not be pruned until next winter. This group includes such shrubs as crape myrtle and althea.

Climbing roses which bloom only in spring are pruned very severely as soon as they are through blooming. The old canes are removed, leaving only the new stems.

Mrs. Leon Lane of Hertford, maid of honor, wore a dress of navy blue with white accessories and a corsage of red carnations.


Leon D. Lane of Hertford was best man.

SOIL CONSERVATION NOTES

J. P. Trueblood and Bryant Miller have recently had a lead ditch cleaned out with a dragline. Mr. Trueblood is also having some field ditches cut with a dragline.

A considerable amount of ditching has been done with draglines in Perquimans County during the past winter and this spring. Two draglines have been operating regularly in this county since last December and another one part of the time.

A. T. Banks who has a farm in the Chapanoke community is planning to seed some Bicolor lespedeza. Mr. Banks plans to seed the Bicolor on the spoil banks of a ditch along the edge of woods. Bicolor lespedeza is a shrub that grows from five to ten feet high. Like the other lespedeza, it is a legume. Bicolor is a preferred food for quail as they eat the seeds in preference to their usual favorites—Annual lespedeza, Cowpeas, Partridge peas, and acorns. The bobwhites begin seeding on Bicolor in early fall, before hunting season, and will continue to use this food until they change to insects and fresh fruits in early summer.
