Congratulating The Graduates

The 1951 crop of graduates of Perquimans County schools may have finished their educational training but they must realize, as they face this perplexed world, that the future holds a problem for them that cannot be solved entirely by the fact that they hold a diploma.

We see no reason for pessimism on the part of the graduates but nothing is to be gained by ignoring the stern facts that confront modern civilization. To learn these facts, to understand their causes and to intelligently meet them is to score a life success, regardless of the tricks that fate may have in store.

The Weekly congratulates the young who have earned the diplomas they receive. Due recognition of their successful study is well-merited. After all, the young students have met and mastered difficulties that, at their age, are equal to any that they will meet later on.

Red Faces

The continuing parade of Hollywood ex-Communists before the House Un-American Activities Committee is instructive. Many of the witnesses were attracted in more youthful days to the emotional periphery of the Communist movement. As they came up against the hard core of party dogma the party discipline they became disillusioned. Their faces are now far more red than their thinking.

Charity is in order for these penitents. Some of them are risking their reputations and livelihoods by coming forward to make a clean breast of their past mistakes and cooperate in uncovering further subversion. The New Testament is authority for rejoicing more over "one sinner that repenteth" than over ninety-nine just persons who "need no repentance."

Yet, strangely enough, there is a tendency to penalize the ex-Communist who has had the courage to break away from his former affiliations despite the knowledge that he was thereby opening himself to persecution by Communist and anti-Communist alike. One would think that society would hold out to the confused young radicals from the wavering edge of communism every inducement to prove their loyalty effectively when they have seen the light.

A distinction needs to be drawn between the muddled "idealists" who gravitated toward communism because of some vague hope of a utopian new order and the tough power addicts, the disciplined fanatics, the trained and tried agents who form the permanent cadres of communism. When the latter desert they seem sometimes almost as untrustworthy in their anti-communism as they were formerly in their communism, as rigid in their thinking, seeing everything in terms of black and white, merely switching the devils and saints in their world of absolutes.

But the red-faced, faltering prodigal is another matter. He needs to be welcomed back when he tires of eating husks.

A Source Of Workers

The employment of women in industry has increased nine times between 1870 and 1950, according to Miss Frieda S. Miller, director of the Women's Bureau, Department of Labor, who points out that, during the same period, employment of men increased only four times as much.

Miss Miller says that the 99,000,000 women not now in the labor force constitute this country's largest labor reservoir. Not all are available for employment but improvement in working standards have made it possible for many women to work.

Let's Save Lives

Now that the summer vacation season is approaching, it may not be amiss to repeat the old warning that careful driving is what the nation needs if it is to reduce the horrible cost of speed on our highways.

One hundred Americans die every day in payment of the price for mod-

ern, high-speed transportation. It is strange that the public is so apathetic to the loss of life and that the injured are hardly noticed by the people generally. If some strange, unknown disease took a hundred victims a day in the United States, there would be a hysterical reign of terror throughout the nation.

Perquimans County, like every other community, furnishes its quota of victims to the highway toll every year. It is not enough for us to sit back and say, "it won't happen to us," or to be satisfied the Highway Patrol will prevent all accidents. The Patrol does an excellent job but it needs the help and support of every citizen in supporting the work of the traffic officers and by careful driving by motorists.

Let's save lives by taking time to drive carefully.
