

Perquimans Indians Beat Williamston To Win Albemarle Conference Title

Perquimans High School won its fifth straight Albemarle Conference baseball championship on Thursday night of last week when the Indians overthrew Williamston High School in a one-sided game 14-0. Vernon White, Freshman twirler for the Indians, pitched a no-hit, no-run game until he was relieved in the ninth frame by Earl Rogerson, Senior pitcher, who struck out three of four batters.

White kept tight control over the Williamston batters, striking out 11, walking only three, for a perfect game. His teammates collected 12 hits and five walks off two Williamston pitchers.

The contest was the play-off for the Albemarle Conference title, the Indians have previously defeated Williamston in a game played at Williamston.

Clyde Lane led the Indians at the bat with three hits for three trips to the plate, and other leading hitters for the Indians were Bright, with a triple; Walker, A. L. Lane and Hunter.

Both teams committed several errors but the superior playing by the Indians enabled Perquimans to capture the contest. Perquimans scored three runs in the second inning, four in the fourth, two in the fifth and five in the eighth.

Coach Elie Fearing substituted an entirely new team in the field at the beginning of the ninth inning, and the reserves quickly retired the side.

Vegetables Will Top Food List For June

Fresh vegetables will be at the top of the shopping order in June Mrs. Nina White, county home agent for the State College Extension Service, said this week in listing the foods that will be plentiful for the month in the Southeast.

Mrs. White explained that June is a month when locally grown fresh vegetables reach volume production. From nearby garden and truck areas markets will receive such vegetables as cabbage, lettuce, potatoes, green beans, spinach, tomatoes, and others. Unless unfavorable weather upsets production, these locally produced vegetables will be among the best food buys for June.

In addition to fresh vegetables, markets will feature plenty of oranges, canned apples and applesauce, canned citrus juices, peanut butter, dry beans, cottage cheese, broilers, fryers, and fish.

The 1950-51 packs of canned apples and applesauce are record-large. Recent chick replacements in the major broiler growing areas indicate retail supplies of broilers and fryers also may reach record proportions in June.

School For Patrolmen Will Start June 18th

A second Highway Patrol Training School will be held June 18 through July 27 at the Institute of Government in Chapel Hill, Col. James R. Smith, commander of the State Highway Pa-

trool, has reported. The school will follow immediately after the present school, which closes June 15. The two schools are being conducted to train highway patrolmen to fill the 105 new Patrol posts created by the 1951 General Assembly. The additional patrolmen will bring the Patrol to its newly authorized strength of 628 men. Seventy men are training in the present school.

Qualified men interested in attending the school beginning June 18 should submit their applications immediately to Col. Smith. The present starting salary for patrolmen is \$2,608 a year.

The increase in Patrol personnel was authorized by the General Assembly to help meet present traffic problems on North Carolina highways, brought about by increases in motor vehicle

State Patrolmen's Pay Boosted On July 1st

Effective July 1, 1951, the starting salary for patrolmen will be \$2,608 annually or \$224 monthly, according to James R. Smith, Commander of the State Highway Patrol.

The Patrol School now is in progress and the second school, beginning June

18th, will furnish the additional patrolmen needed to bring the Patrol to its newly authorized strength of 628 men.

Recruits attending the school will receive board and room during the training period, the regular salary to begin upon certification by the Department of Motor Vehicles upon completion of the training period. Uniforms and equipment are furnished each patrolman and successfully completes the school.
