

Feed Demonstration Now Being Conducted

Two swine feeding demonstrations are underway in this county, it was reported today by the county agent's office. One with R. S. Chappell, of Route one, and the other with Clarence Chappell of Belvidere. The purpose of this demonstration is to attempt to prove value of A. P. F. in swine rations. The pigs in each case were from two litters, and divided using some from both litters in each pen. All will have access to the same rations, except A. P. F. will be added to rations in one pen on each farm. The pigs were weighed at the start of this test, and will be checked each 30 days while on feed. This demonstration is being conducted with the assistance of J. K. Butler, Jr., Extension Specialist from State College.

33,909 Persons Granted Driving Licenses In May

Driver's licenses examiners of the Department of Motor Vehicles issued licenses to drive to 33,909 persons during May.

Of the number 28,174 were operator's licenses, 2,414 were duplicate operator's licenses, 479 were chauffeur's and 59 duplicate chauffeur's licenses.

Net revenue collected from issuance of licenses was \$74,149.50 of which \$86,837.00 came from original operator's licenses; \$1,522.50 from duplicate licenses; both operator's and chauffeurs; and \$5,790 from original chauffeur's licenses.

Proceedings Of Commissioners

June 4, 1951

At a regular meeting of the Board of County Commissioners, of Perquimans County, held at the Court House on the first Monday, the 4th day of June, 1951; present and presiding A. T. Lane, Chairman, with Commissioner E. B. Hollowell, R. S. Chappell, Wm. C. Chappell and E. A. Turner. Absent, none.

On motion ordered, that the County approve the Health Budget as presented by the Secretary, which requires Perquimans County to pay the sum of \$6,482.00 for year of 1951-52.

On motion ordered, that the Treasurer pay Miss Mamie Stallings the sum of \$15.00 a month and charge same to outside poor.

On motion ordered, that the county pay one-half of the total cost of a power lawn mower (\$50.00) and J. C. Morgan to pay \$50.00 for the other half, to be used for keeping the lawns at the County Home.

On motion ordered that the U. S. Soil Conservation District Office be located in the Agriculture Building at Hertford, N. C.

Miss Martha E. Barnett, tendered her resignation as Assistant Home Agent, which on motion was accepted.

On motion, the Board approved the Budget of the Board of Education of Perquimans County in the sum of \$38,841.

On motion, the County Commissioners rejected the Social Security Coverage for the county employees.

On motion ordered, that in compliance with the laws of the State of North Carolina, which designates that all real property on which taxes are due for the current year be sold on the first Monday in May or any of the four succeeding months thereafter. The County Commissioners hereby order that the Sheriff of Perquimans County be and is hereby directed to advertise said lands for sale August 1, and sell such real estate (property) on the first Monday in September, 1951.

On motion ordered, that the budget for the Negro County Agricultural Extension Workers, be and is hereby approved for the year of 1951-52 for the same amount as the budget for 1950-51.

On motion ordered, that the salary of the County Physician be raised from \$8.00 to \$16.00 a month.

On motion ordered that the home of John Wallace Lawe be reduced in value for taxes from \$2,500 to \$2,000.

On motion ordered that C. C. Banks of the County Veterans' Service office be raised from \$500.00 to \$600.00 a year.

On motion ordered, that C. C. Banks, Clerk of Recorder's Court, be paid a salary of \$100.00 a month beginning July 1, 1951.

On motion ordered that Miss Kinsey Perry be and is hereby appointed as Assistant Home Agent for Perquimans County.

On motion ordered, that Earl Topping, Assistant Farm Agent, salary be raised from \$900.00 to \$1,080.00 a year.

On motion, A. T. Lane and E. B. Hollowell are authorized to purchase chairs, rugs and curtains for the County Home.

On motion ordered, that Zack Phillips Property in Bethel Township,

be reduced for taxes to \$1,750.00.

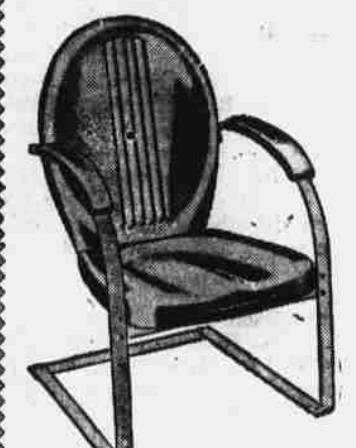
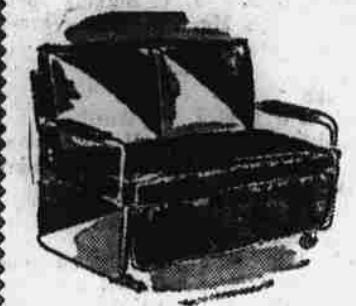
