THE CHURCH UNDER PERSECUTION

International Sunday School Lesson for June 24th, 1951.

Memory Selection: "Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee the crown of life." —Revelation 2: 10.

Lesson Text: ¶ Peter 5: 6-41; Revelation 1: 9-11a; 7: 9-10, 13-14.

Practically every newspaper we pick up today has one or more news dispatches from the war front, telling of unusual heroism on the part of some soldier, sailor or marine, in the face of trying circumstances or in the midst of terrible danger.

At the time Peter wrote his epistle, which forms part of the Scripture basis for our lesson this week, the early Christians, and Peter himself, were undergoing severe persecutions, being imprisoned and mistreated in every imaginable way. This was during the reign of the evil Nero, when Christians were sought out by dogs and torn to bits by wild animals.

Peter and the other disciples had been persecuted and imprisoned, yet he and they remained faithful, so he could, out of his own experience, advise others. Peter declared: "Cast all your cares upon Him, for He careth for you." We are to look to God in humble trust, believing that He cares for and watches over His own. Therefore, in times of trouble, Christians should remain calm (sober), vigilant, ever on the alert against temptation, and doing all possible to resist the devil, who, Peter says; goes around like a roaring lion, seeking when he may describe the says of the whom he may devour.

Peter explained that the fiery trials come to try us, to prove us, and, as it is necessary for fine metals to be it is necessary for fine metals to be tested by fire, so that the dross may be burned away and the gold purified, so Christians are tested and proved. History shows that the early Christians proved themselves faithful. The courageous way they acted during the terrible persecutions heaped upon them, did more than enything else to defeat their enemies. Christianity conquered because the early Christians conquered because the early Christians would not be conquered, but bore their crosses with songs of triumph rather than with cries of defeat.

Now, the scene changes from Rome to the isle of Patmos, where the Apostle John had been banished. The early Christians were being persecuted for no other reason than that they were Christians. John wished to encourage them to be faithful by relating to them the vision he had received from God—of God and of Heaven. He not only saw God, but he also saw a great mulitude of people—the faithful from every nation-clothed in their white garments of purity, wor-shipping the Almishty with palm branches—the symbols of victory, in their hands.


John also saw the Lamb, standing near the throne of God—a partner with Him in ruling the Universe, Who is the Lamb? He is the Son of God— Jesus Christ, who "becsme flesh and dwelt among us" (Jno. 1: 14). John the Baptist declared, "Behold the Lamb of God" (Jno. 1: 36). John haid the robes of the multitude were white because they had been washed "in the blood of the Lamb." In His death on the cross, Christ showed God's love and bore man's penalty. Those who accept Him are redeemed the Him blood. by His blood.

God has not only provided a way of salvation, he has also given us victory over tribulation, supplying our needs and comforting our sorrows. Christians all over the world today will do well to remember that God helps to meet the distressing circumstances of this life and he also gives promise of final victory in the life to come, if we remain faithful.

He does not promise to eliminate troubles from our lives, but he promises to give us victory over them if we ask Him for belp. Someone has said that Christians should never pray that troubles be removed from their lives, but that God would give sufficient strength to bear them.
