In Eastern North Carolina a slightly different procedure is used for device therries. As soon as the crop is harvested, all canes, both old and young, are removed at the ground. Then the land is cultivated and a top-dressing of nitrate of soda is given the plants. In a few days new shoots will appear and make sufficient growth during the rest of the season to produce a good crop the next year. This new growth is allowed to run along the ground and is not tied up to stakes until next spring.

This practice, as outlined, gives a fair control of anthracnose disease of dewberries. The plant growth that is cut off at the ground should be destroyed by burning. In the mountain areas the season is not always long enough to permit the removal of new canes. In that case only the old canes are removed.
