

National Christian Education Week Sept. 30 To Oct. 7

"Teach Religion—Make Men Free" is the theme for Christian Education Week to be observed September 30-October 7.

Sponsored by the Division of Christian Education of the National Council of Churches and its 40 member denominational boards of education, the special week will offer churches an opportunity to demonstrate the importance of Christian teaching and to launch their new program of work for the fall and winter months.

"This theme is most appropriate to the times," declared Dr. Roy G. Ross, executive secretary of the division and associate general secretary of the National Council. "It is only on true religious faith that lasting freedom can be built. It is imperative that we nurture this faith and that we teach children, youth, and adults its meaning for our day."

Daily themes have been designated as follows for this 21st annual celebration of Christian Education Week:

Sunday, September 30, Rally Day—"Religion—the Foundation of Freedom."

Monday, October 1, Leaders Day—"Responsibilities of the Free."

Tuesday, October 2, Family Day—"The Family Teaches."

Wednesday, October 3, Local Church Day—"The Church Teaches."

Thursday, October 4, Community Day—"The Community Teaches."

Friday, October 5, Youth Day—"Youth—Answer the Call of Christ."

Saturday, October 6, Personal Meditation Day—"Be Still and Know."

Sunday, October 7, World Communion Sunday—"Fellowship in Christ—Freedom's Cornerstone."

Church Program To Be Continued

Directors of the Rural Church Institute of North Carolina, meeting at State College last week, voted to continue the rural church program as part of the annual Farm and Home Week and to try to get at least 500 rural ministers to attend in 1952, according to L. R. Harrill, president of the institute.

The program on the rural church, held as part of Farm and Home Week this year for the first time, met with enthusiastic approval from the farm men and women attending, Harrill said.

The Rev. Garland Stafford of Lewisville will be in charge of the institute's program for the 1952 Farm and Home Week. M. G. Mann of Raleigh will head the finance committee, with L. Y. Ballentine, State Commissioner of Agriculture, in charge of membership work.

The new nominating committee consists of Dr. Joseph H. Carter of Newton, the Rev. J. A. Evans of Wilson, and the Rev. Wilson Nesbit of West Jefferson.

Plans for sponsoring a rural church exhibit at the N. C. State Fair were discussed by the group. E. B. Garrett of Raleigh was named chairman of a committee to plan an exhibit for 1952.

Theme for the rural church program at Farm and Home Week this year has been "A New Day of Oppor-

tunity for the Rural Church." The program included an address by James W. Sells of Atlanta, in charge of rural church work for the Methodist Church, and a panel discussion on rural church problems led by Governor Scott, the Rev. Dumont Clarke of Asheville, M. G. Mann, and Dr. S. L. Stealey, president of the Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary at Wake Forest.

New York Popular Place For Tarheels

Nearly 212,000 North Carolina residents will visit New York this year, a New York City hotel survey has indicated.

"During the year, New York's population will be swelled by 13,000,000 out-of-towners who will spend well over a billion dollars seeing the big-city sights," declared Floyd W. Jefferson, president of the New York Board of Trade, in commenting on the 1951 travel season.

Ranking in popularity with the Statue of Liberty, Times Square and the Empire State Building as favorite attractions are the RCA Exhibition Hall in Radio City where visitors view a free display of the latest

The estimate of the number of visitors from North Carolina was based on a hotel survey conducted over a one-year period.

The survey showed that June is the most popular month for North Carolina visitors. They will stay an average of four days and spend about \$100 each in New York, it was reported.
