The King Bros. show, with Joe Mix, will exhibit in Elizabeth City Monday, August 27, opposite the Pepsi-Cola Bottling Plant under the auspices of the Elizabeth City Lions Club.

Two special convoys are used to transport this great organization from city to city. Traveling with the circus are 800 employees in addition to 30 advance men. Twenty-two tents covering 12 acres of ground house the transient city in the daytime.

The famous King Bros. menagerie, declared to be the finest and most complete traveling zoo in the world is a part of the show. Many new, rare and costly specimens of the wild animal kingdom have been gathered from all parts of the globe. Tapirs, gnus, Vlaak Varks, lions, tigers, camels, dromedaries, zebras, leopards, panthers, yaks, emus, Jaguara islands, seals, a giant giraffe, and a herd of elephants are but a part of the traveling university of natural history.

Joe Mix, the screen's famous Western star with a congress of cowboys, cowgirls, Indians, Cossacks and rough riders will be seen in a spectacular revival of the old West.

Performances will be given at 2 and 8 P. M. Doors will be opened an hour earlier to permit an inspection of the zoo.
