Penny Postal About To Go

The penny postcard will pass out of the picture on January 1st, when the law increasing postal rates by \$117,000,000 annually goes into effect.

There are some other changes in postal rates but the 8-cent charge an ounce for first-class mail and six-cents an ounce for air mail are not changed. Third class mail, largely circulars and advertising matter will be increased from a minimum of one-cent each to one-and-one-half-cent. Special delivery of letters will cost twenty cents instead of fifteen.

The increase in postal revenues is to be added to the \$100,000,000 in added parcel cost charges recently included in an Interstate Commerce Commission decision. The chronic deficit of the Postoffice Department will not be eliminated, however. Revenue from the increases will be offset by a \$250,000,000 pay rise recently voted by Congress for postal workers.

Cost-of-Living Index Good

Because many contracts between labor and management contain a cost-of-living escalator clause, the Consumers' Price Index, upon which changes in wages are based, becomes an important report.

Those in a position to know assert that the Bureau has won well-earned recognition from ranking leaders in organizations in the field of economics. The work has been done in a non-partisan and non-political manner.

Because of the probability that the cost-of-living yardstick will be used in an increasing number of agreements to regulate the pay of workers, it is vitally important that the independence of the Bureau be sustained.

It is to be noted that a sub-committee of the House Committee on Education and Labor, after extensive public hearings, has expressed its confidence in the Bureau, while recommending that it have a free hand and that its statistical work "should not be subject to yearly fluctuations" in the budget.

Big Crops Needed Again Next Year

The farmers in Perquimans County along with those in other sections of the United States, will be called upon to produce big crops again next year, with special emphasis on food grains, livestock and cotton. This is the forecast as the Department of Agriculture prepared production goals for farm commodities in 1952.

Another side of the picture comes from the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, which predicts that 1952 will bring more jobs, higher consumer incomes and perhaps some additional price increases, but warns that the increase in income is likely to be limited to non-farmers.

The American farmer, according to Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan, is supposed to do three things:

(1) Produce enough to supply the nation's growing military forces with food and growing defense industries with raw materials.

(2) Produce enough to supply with good diets the 150,000,000 people who make up the nation's civilian population and, so far as possible, enough more to carry at the same time a safe margin of strategic reserves.

(3) Produce enough to back up the nation's foreign policy by enabling us to continue to share our food and fiber to the fullest possible extent with friendly countries in need of help.

Against this program, the farmers are advised not to expect to share the prospective increase in economic activity because of rising production costs. While "non-agricultural income is currently at a record high and is expected to continue to rise in 1952," production costs of farmers are expected to rise above the record level of 1951.

It may be that cash receipts from farm marketings, which produced a net income of about \$15,000,000,000 in 1951, will show some increase in 1952, reflecting heavier marketings but "the realized net income" will be

about the same as this year.

Moreover, "the purchasing power of farmers' net income will remain substantially less than in 1947 and 1949."

In accepting the higher production goals, the American farmer will face the problems of inflation, world unrest, labor shortages and the scarcity of machines and materials essential to high productivity. Meanwhile, they can look forward to good markets at home and abroad and a continuation of current prosperity. This is due to the large crops being raised because farm prices are now seven per cent lower than they were earlier in the year.

The job of producing food, feed and fiber is not entirely an agricultural problem. Some of the task lies in the hands of American industry, which must produce the fertilizers, insecticides and machinery which the farmers will have to have to reach peak production of farm commodities.

Against this economic background comes a word of hope from Willard L. Thorp, Assistant-Secretary of State for Foreign Economic Affairs. Mr. Thorp predicts that the economic hazards which affect the farmer will begin to disappear in the latter part of 1952 or the early part of 1953. He reports that last year was the best the world has ever experienced in economic terms, attributing part of the result to the fact that investments made by the E. C. A. in foreign countries are beginning to bear fruit.
