

Wildlife Poster Contest Announced

The National Wildlife Federation of Washington, D. C., announces its 15th Annual Conservation Poster Contest. The first week of Spring. Other prizes ranging from \$50 to \$100.

The purpose of the contest is to develop a nationwide interest, particularly among young people, in the need for restoration and conservation of our organic natural resources.

The contest is open to all students anywhere in the United States from the seventh grade through the last year in high school.

The contest will be divided into two groups. Group I will cover all contestants from the seventh, eighth, and ninth grades. Group II will cover the high school grades through the senior year.

The first prize for Group I is \$100 and for Group II, \$250. The awards will be made in connection with National Wildlife Restoration Week celebration.

Posters may be submitted in oil, watercolor, black and white and other media, and are to be sent to the National Wildlife Federation, Washington, D. C., to be received not later than January 31, 1952.
