College Education High

The younger generation these days is finding that a college education is not easily paid for. Because money is comparatively plentiful at this time, the real effects of increased tuition bills and increased fees in colleges has not yet produced its full impact.

However, colleges all over the United States have been forced to increase their tuition rates, room and board charges have skyrocketed in many instances, and the cost of materials, clothes and food—not to mention other essentials—is up appreciably. A recent survey showed that tuition at many colleges has doubled in less than ten years and in many cases they have risen far more rapidly than the cost of living and the average pay check.

This poses a serious question for all Americans, since this country's heritage is, to a large extent, tied up with low cost, liberal education. Most of this country's great leaders have received their foundation in a liberal arts school of some kind.

The colleges are not to be blamed, necessarily, because, in many cases, their endowments have shrunk in proportion to the increase in inflation and, in other cases, their long-time investments pay interest rates today which are considerably lower than the average and not in line with increased costs of operation. The problem is an American problem, which may eventually have to be decided by the taxpayer, in one form or the other.

An acute situation is arising, where in high school graduates with meritorious records are not financially able to attend college. The number of such students will increase greatly as soon as a period of deflation sets in.

While the armed services offer this unfortunate youth a course of life, and while these military services need the manpower, this is nevertheless a regrettable situation. The problem is being studied by private colleges and by many leading citizens independently. It merits the serious thought of every American.

White House White Again

The White House in Washington again looks as it is supposed to look—with a new coat of white paint and the scaffolding taken down after three years of remodeling. It is reported that President Truman finally became disgusted with the repeated delays and ordered work to be completed speedily.

Taxpayers will be interested to know that the three-year remodeling job cost \$5,500,000 and has required the services of an army of workmen ever since late 1948. The Executive mansion is said to be redone inside and out.

In this connection, it is interesting to speculate whether the President responsible for the remodeling—Mr. Truman—will be permitted to enjoy the modern conveniences of the new White House for any considerable period of time. Present estimates call for the Truman family's removal from Blair House, across the street, to the White House in April. If this schedule is met, the President will have only nine months of assured occupancy—since his present term expires in January, 1953.

If the President runs and is elected again, he will, of course, be the resident in the White House for another four years. In his current term, however, he lived in the White House only a few weeks after the 1948 election and will live in it only about nine months between April, and January, 1953. Whatever else he has done, Mr. Truman has provided a modern comfortable home for the next President of the United States, even if it is not himself.
