International Sunday School Less For March 30, 1952.

Memory Selection: "You shall re-ceive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Ju-dea and Samaria and to the end of the earth."—Acts 1: 8.

Lesson Text; Luke 1: 1-4; Acts 1: 1-2; 16: 6-10; Colossians 4: 14.

A man, whom Paul, the great apostle, referred to as "the beloved physician," is Luke, about whom we are to study this week. This man was the only Gentile among the authors of the New Testament books.

The name Luke (which means "light-giving"), appears three times in the New Testament—Colossians 4:

14 If Timothy 4: 11 and Philemon 24.

14, II Timothy 4: 11, and Philemon 24, in which he is referred to as "Lucas." While we do not know very much about his background, it is probable that he was born in Antioch in Syria, and was learned in the science of medicine. He was not born a Jew, but was probably a Greek. He was au-thor of the gospel which bears his name and also of the Acts of the

Luke begins his gospel with these words: "Forasmuch as many have taken in hand to set forth in order a declaration of those things which are most surely believed among us, even as they delivered them unto us, which from the beginning were eye-witnesses, and ministers of the word; it seemed good to me also, having had perfect understanding of all things from the very first, to write unto thee in order, most excellent Theophilus, that thou mightest know the certainty of those things wherein thou has been instructed."

We know from the books of Acts.

We know, from the books of Acts, that he became a companion of Paul, either in Galatia or at Troas on Paul's second missionary tour. For several years, he was a close companion of Paul's—so intimate was their fellowship that he was able to reflect the innermost thoughts of this wonderful spirit. Although Luke does not mention his own name, he generally speaks of Paul's missionary party as "we" when he was present and "They" when he was not with them.

Luke went as far as Philippi with Paul and then we hear no more of him on Paul's second missionary journey. But, in Acts 20: 5, 6, we see the word "we" again and it presupposes that Luke once more joined Paul and went with him through Mileton.

poses that Luke once more joined Paul and went with him through Miletus, Tyre, and Caesarea to Jerusalem.

When Paul returned to Philippi some years later, Luke was there and he accompanied Paul in his travels until they reached Rome. When Paul wrote his letter to the Colossians, Luke was with him and was included in Paul's closing saluation: "Luke, the beloved physician, and Demas, greet you" (Col. 4: 14): Luke stayed with Paul in Rome until he was ed with Paul in Rome until he was released from his first imprisonment and was with him again in Rome during his second imprisonment. He wa a source of much comfort to Paul, re-maining faithful to him when others forsook him.

Luke's profession as a doctor is apparent in his writings. It is Dr. Luke who gives the intimate details of the birth of Jesus, which he probably received firsthand from Mary, the muther of Jesus. Luke relates more of Jesus' miracles of healing and the similar experiences. In the life more of Jesus' miracles of healing and also similar experiences in the life of the apostles in later years.

In telling the story of Christianity, Luke recognized Jeans as the supreme maker of history and, in the gospel that bears his name, Luke presented Jeans as the universal Saviour of all mankind. He also recognized that the second najor factor in the story of Christianity was the work of the Holy Spirit, inspiring and empowering witnesses, who pread the gospel messages to the ends of the earth. This story he told in the book of Acts.

Luke witnessed through his work as a physician and as a historian, making Christ known to the generations who came after him. We, too, can make him known through Christian witnessing in our daily work.
