

Forest Fires In State Increase

Damage estimated at \$147,917 was caused by 472 fires that swept over 39,082 acres of forest and open land in North Carolina last month, State Forester Fred H. Claridge reports as he again stresses the danger of forest fires at this season of the year.

The danger of forest fires will not lessen to any appreciable extent unless people take all known precautions to prevent them, Claridge said, adding: "The quicker all of us realize this plain fact the better off the State will be as a whole because we must not forget that our forests are among our most valuable assets."

The number of forest fires in February exceeded those of January by 99 and caused almost triple the damage resulting in January when 373 fires swept over 20,674 acres of forest and open land, causing estimated losses of \$56,992.

Carelessness on the part of brush burners was blamed for 227 of last month's 472 fires. Smokers were charged with starting 95, incendiaries were accused of starting 74, campers and hunters reportedly started 17, and the remainder were charged to miscellaneous causes.

How To Prevent Them
Safe rules to prevent forest fires, Claridge pointed out, are: hold your match till it's cold—then pinch it to make sure it's out; crush out all your smokers, and where there is an ash-tray, use it; down your campfire and warming fire, then stir and drown again; and if you must use fire to clear old fields or fence rows, to burn brush, ferns or trash, get a permit if required. Follow safe rules, burn on

clear days only, have help and tools on hand from start to finish, and fill every spark before you leave the burned area.

Hybrid Corn Seed In Short Supply

Tar Heel corn growers face a shortage of some certified corn hybrids unless they make arrangements now for their seed supply, says R. P. Moore, director of the Crop Improvement Association at State College.

Drought in other southern states, particularly Georgia and South Carolina, is producing a drain on North Carolina's supply. Such popular hybrids as Dixie 18 and N. C. 27 are moving south in large quantities.

The supply of Dixie 18 which is adapted to the Southeastern part of the State is already extremely short. The supply of N. C. 27 is dwindling rapidly. Dixie 17, which is adaptable to the Piedmont, is practically sold out at some sources.

Dixie 52, one of the most promising new hybrids which is adapted to cobs. Both graded the sample "yet the same area as N. C. 27, is still adequate. To combat any rumors that Dixie 52 will not grade yellow because of its red tinge, Moore sent samples to the State Department of Agriculture and corn buyers in Ohio" without question.

U. S. 928, popular in the mountains, is still adequate for the demand. New
