BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education met in regular session Monday, July 7, 1952, at 8 P. M. All members were present. Chairman J. E. Morris presided.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The final change order of the contract for Perquimans Training School was approved in the amount of \$2,000.00.

The teacher allotment for 1952-53 school term was announced by the Superintendent. There will be one additional high school teacher for the white schools and one for the Negro schools, and one elementary teacher for the white schools.

September 3, 1952, was approved as the date for school to open its 1952-53 term.

It was recommended that the same type of insurance be offered to the

pupils as was in effect last year. The Board approved the various items of the budget for the 1952-53 school year.

PROCEEDINGS OF COMMISSIONERS

July 7, 1952.

At a regular meeting of the Board of County Commissioners held at the Court House on the first Monday, the 7th day of July, 1952, present and presiding, A. T. Lane, chairman, with Commissioners William G. Chappell, E. B. Hollowell, E. A. Turner and R. S. Chappell. Absent, none.

On motion ordered, that County purchase electric cook stove for use of the keeper of the County Home.

On motion ordered, that County purchase electric iron for County Home.

On motion ordered, that Luelle Riddick's salary as janitor be raised from \$40 to \$45 a month, beginning July 1, 1952.

On motion and passed, A. T. Lane, chairman of the Board, and J. W. Ward are directed to have such repairs made to the floors of the Court House as they deem necessary.

On motion ordered, that the sum of \$2,000 of the State beer tax due Perquimans County be allotted to capital outlay.

On motion ordered, that S. M. Whedbee, delinquent tax collector for real estate be and is hereby directed to reduce the interest or tax due Perquimans County in the amount of 25 per cent, listed to T. S. Foster and known as 10 acres of White land valued on tax book at \$75.00.

A petition was presented to the County Commissioners signed by a considerable number of residents of the Road Landing Road and citizens of Bethel Township, requesting that the State Highway and Public Works Commission hard surface that certain road known as the Road Landing Road, a distance of about 4 miles. On motion, the request was approved by the Board and the petition filed with the Highway Commission.

On motion, that Commissioners approve an addition to the State highway system, known as the "Jones, Blanchard or Tucker Farm Lane," leading from New Hope road to the Tucker farm on Little River, a distance of about three-fourths of a mile.

Perquimans County budget for fiscal year 1952-53 proposed by Board of County Commissioners, and advertised according to law:

Appropriation Resolution

Be it resolved, by the Board of County Commissioners of Perquimans County, North Carolina, this 7th day of July, 1952. That for the expenses of County government, its activities and institutions, for the year of 1952-53, the following amounts for the various funds are hereby appropriated in the total amounts as follows:

On motion, it is hereby ordered by the Board of County Commissioners of Perquimans County, North Carolina, that the following ad valorem tax be levied for the year 1952-53 on the one hundred dollars valuation of all real and personal property which each tax payer owns on January 1, 1952, listed or required to be listed by law for the payment of the expenses of the County government, viz:

First: General County, a tax of 15c on each \$100 valuation, \$10,500.00.

Second: Farm Agent, County Agent, Home Agent, Fire Warden and Veterans Administration, a tax of 15c on each \$100 valuation, \$10,500.00.

Third: Health Department and Hospitalization, a tax of 15c on each \$100 valuation, \$10,500.00.

Fourth: Poor Fund, a tax of 12c on each \$100 valuation, \$8,400.00.

Fifth: Debt Service, a tax of 70c on each \$100 valuation, \$49,000.00.

Sixth: General School, a tax of 88c on each \$100 valuation, \$23,100.00.

Seventh: Old Age Assistance, a tax of 8c on each \$100 valuation, \$6,000.00.

Eighth: Aid to Dependent Children, a tax of 4c on each \$100 valuation, \$2,800.00.

Ninth: Welfare Administration, a tax of 8c on each \$100 valuation, \$6,000.00.

Tax Rate, \$1.80. Total raised, \$126,000.00.

Ten: On motion ordered by the County Commissioners of Perquimans County, that all taxes due Perquimans County and collectible under Schedule "B" as approved by law, shall be collected by the Sheriff of Perquimans County, and paid over to the County Treasurer.

On motion ordered, the Treasurer is hereby directed to refund Emmett White the sum of \$_____ for taxes collected through error.

On motion the Treasurer is ordered to pay the following bills:
