Neglected Counties

Last week Governor W. Kerr Scott took the huge sum of \$750,000 from a surplus in the State Highway Fund and allocated it to his home county of Alamance, for construction of additional highways in that county.

Having opposed the Governor's \$200,000,000 road bond issue, some three years ago, we are now crying out over this unfair action of one county receiving such a large hunk of surplus funds for roads in addition to those constructed under the bond issue program.

We want only that Perquimans receive its full and fair share of the road bond funds, inasmuch as the people of Perquimans will have to share their equal part in repayment of this large debt.

However, we can not swallow the Highway Chairman's explanation of this \$750,000 grant to Alamance. The chairman, Henry Jordan, said that Scott "felt his county has been neglected for a period of years." We do not doubt this statement or its accuracy but we do say that if Alamance has been neglected it is not alone among the neglected counties.

To our way of thinking all of the counties of the Albemarle have long been neglected in many ways and it is our belief that if the State of North Carolina has surplus funds to be split up, then the splitting should be done on a fair and equal plan whereby all counties receive some benefits.

We Agree

We are heartily in agreement with an editorial in The Daily Advance in which that newspaper proposes Governor-elect William B. Umstead, on assuming office, appoint a resident of a north Albemarle county to serve as State Highway Commissioner for the First District.

As pointed out by The Daily Advance, it has been many a long year since a resident of one of the north Albemarle counties has served in this capacity, and to our way of thinking the area has suffered because of it.

U. S. Highway 17, one of the nation's most traveled routes, has not received the attention nor the advance construction needed in these days of increased highway traffic, insofar as that stretch between the Choway River and the Virginia line is concerned.

One of the worse hazards on Highway 17, within North Carolina, is the causeway at Hertford. Accidents and death have occurred at this spot, yet, the State Highway Commission has done little to bring this stretch of roadway up to modern highway standards. It has been content to place small amounts of asphalt at the sides in order to widen the road slightly but has done nothing to eliminate the always present hazards.

Like The Daily Advance, we have a candidate for the post and believe his appointment will meet with the approval of each and every county within this district.

Our choice for the job as Highway Commissioner is State Senator J. Emmett Winslow, one of the most widely known residents of the district and who is well acquainted with the highway problems of the area.

We invite our readers and all other residents of the District in backing Mr. Winslow for the post.

Field Marshal Kesselring

One of West German's most powerful veterans' organizations recently elected former Field Marshal Albert Kesselring as its president. Kesselring, generally credited with being a brilliant military tactician, was commander-in-chief of German forces in Italy, and, in the last days of the war on the Western Front, he succeeded Field Marshal Rundsted.

The most interesting fact in this case is that Kesselring is now serving a life-time sentence. He was sentenced to a life term by British War Crimes Court in Vienna in 1947, on charges of having permitted the massacre of Italian civilians during World War II.

Originally, he was sentenced to be hanged, but the death sentence was commuted to life imprisonment and the former Marshal is now a prisoner at the town of Wessges. The German veterans organization declared: "The hour has come for our people to declare that the decency of German sold-

iers is beyond question, and to reject all attacks on their character as unjust slanders."

This is history repeating itself, in almost every detail, for the same public reaction followed in Germany after World War I. As the Allies relinquish more and more controls in Germany, the German people will once again become independent and, perhaps, anti-allied and, in the end, the United States and Great Britain and other allies will be confronted with a free and powerful German nation. About all the United States can do is to hope that the Russian threat proves so serious that the Germans will turn to the West, in preference to the Communists.

The realization remains, however, that wars do not solve major conflicts in relations between nations and that, at best, they only suppress open antagonisms for just a short period of years.

July Driving Drunk Convictions Jump

The Department of Motor Vehicles reports that 636 North Carolinians were convicted of drunken driving in July and thereby lost their legal driving privileges. The July figure rose sharply from the 567 persons convicted of similar charges in June. The drunken driving convictions are contained in the regular monthly summary of violations requiring the surrender of operator's permits prepared by the Department.

Other convictions reported in July included 81 for speeding over 75 mph; 69 for two offenses of speeding over 55 mph; 54 for reckless driving; 47 for driving after license revoked; and 20 for driving after license suspended.

July convictions resulted in 929 revocations and 528 suspensions.

State Fair Premium Catalog Off Press

Listing premiums totaling more than \$50,000, the catalog of the 1962 North Carolina State Fair to be held October 14-18 in Raleigh is now being distributed. Robert W. Shoffner, assistant director of the State College Extension Service and assistant to Dr. J. S. Dorton in the management of the Fair, says farm people and other prospective exhibitors may obtain a copy of the free 212-page book by writing: Manager, State Fair, P. O. Box 1888, Raleigh.

"The State Fair premium list this year is by far the largest in the 99-year history of the annual fall festival," Shoffner said, "and many additions and changes have been made since 1951. Therefore, previous exhibitors should immediately obtain a copy of the 1962 catalog and study it carefully before making their entries and preparing their exhibits."

Highlighting the 1962 list is competition "open to the world" in all breeds of Dairy Cattle, and in the Hereford and Aberdeen-Angus breeds of beef cattle. Special premiums are offered, however, exclusively for North Carolina exhibitors who will have an opportunity to win in both the "open" and "N. C. Special" classes.

Also new this year are rabbit and pigeon shows, each "open to the world," a department for dual purpose cattle (milking shorthorns), and competition for Brahman cattle in the Beef Cattle Department.

Administration of the State Fair has also been reorganized into divisions, with superintendents as follows: J. Wade Hendricks, director of the Piedmont test farm at Statesville, in charge of Division I which includes general exhibits such as field crops, horticulture products, arts & crafts, bees & honey, 4-H Club and other educational exhibits; J. H. Prevette of Raleigh, superintendent of the livestock division; C. F. Parrish, in charge of extension poultry at State College, superintendent of the poultry, pigeon and rabbit division; and Miss Ruth Current, State home demonstration agent, superintendent of the women's division.
