

Farm-Home Week

Perquimans County had five women attending Farm and Home Week this year. They were Mrs. M. T. Griffin, Mrs. R. L. Spivey, Jr., Mrs. Robert Sutton, Mrs. Wynner Madra and Mrs. John Hurdle, who was the official delegate from this county. During Neck Club had the largest representation. Mrs. Sutton, Mrs. Spivey and Mrs. Hurdle all being from there.

The program got underway Monday evening with the Recognition of the men of the year in Service to North Carolina Agriculture and North Carolina "Women of the Year." Guests were welcomed and a talent show presented after which recreation was enjoyed on the field of Riddick Stadium.

There was a joint session Tuesday morning. The general discussion was "Getting Higher Production From Farm Labor." Haywood County won the cup for community development and gave some highlights of their community development program. There were a good example for other counties to follow in cooperating in this program, "North Carolina Accepts the Challenge" being put on at present.

During the rest of the week, more addresses were given and there were classes held each morning and afternoon dealing with sewing and cooking.

The Rural Church Institute presented a program on the Rural Church and Community Life. The fact was stressed that with the consolidation of schools the church was the only source left in local communities, and people were urged to keep them as such, giving them their whole service and support.

On Wednesday evening our own Governor Kerr Scott spoke and the 4-H boys and girls put on a musical program. Classes were held on many subjects. Among these was "Out Of the Frying Pan, into the Broiler," which was showing the actual cooking of three different, balanced meals, while we watched.

A class, "Know Your State," by Mrs. Harriet Pressley, was quite interesting to anyone who loves North Carolina. Thursday is the big day of Farm and Home Week with the State Federation Meeting with Mrs. H. M. Johnson, State President, presiding.

The highlight of this session was the address by Margery Wilson, author and lecturer of New York City. She says, "Home is the cradle of personality," and urged her audience to never put off the children of the home with the excuse, "I have to cook," or "I have to sew," or "I have to go to a meeting." "Take time for your children," she advised "Home is a quality of mind." Social security is a myth. It doesn't exist. The only security we have is within ourselves, she said, and labeled "fear and timidity" as the gravest danger to that inner security. One of the best things she said was "Stand On Your Own Two Feet and Develop a Dynamic Personality." "Learning on things, and other people has made the doctors rich," Miss Wilson said. "When all the time the thing we need is to breathe deeply and to remember that 'You are a child of great power and you have access to that power.'"

Another interesting class was held by Mrs. Corinne Grimaley. The lecture she gave was "Attitudes Are Important." She said, "attitudes are hard to explain, but we influence others more by our attitudes than by what we say or do."

Commissioners' Proceedings

September 2, 1952.

At a regular meeting of the Board of County Commissioners of Perquimans County, held at the Court House on the first Tuesday, the 2nd day of September, 1952; present and presiding A. T. Lane, Chairman, with Commissioners R. S. Chappell, E. B. Hollowell, William C. Chappell and E. A. Turner. Absent none.

On motion, the County Commissioners approved a request that the State Highway and Public Works Commission make an addition to the highway system by adding that certain lane in New Hope Township, leading from Woodland road to Nixon Weeks' property, and known as the Harrell Lane.

On motion, the Board approved a request that the State Highway and Public Works Commission add to the highway system by taking over and keeping in a passable condition that certain lane leading from Goodwin's Mill Road to Norman Chappell and Roland Copeland property, and known as the "Joe Elliott Lane."

On motion, the commissioners authorized the construction of cement walk-way from the gate to the front doorsteps of the main dwelling of the county home.

Tom Willoughby tendered his resignation as janitor of the Court House grounds which on motion was accepted.

Latham Godwin was appointed janitor to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Willoughby.

On motion, the Commissioners approved the application of Annie Bell Pen for aid to Blind.

The Commissioners approved a request made by the Perquimans County Board of Education, that the State Highway keep in a passable condition that certain lane leading from Muddy Creek Road to Royal Jones residence for the benefit of school buses.

On motion the register of deeds is hereby directed to purchase a filing cabinet for his office.

On motion, the contract for auditing the county books for year 1951-52 was awarded the firm of A. M. Russ & Co., Certified Public Accountants of Raleigh, North Carolina, at the bid price of \$1200, which consists of the following work: Audit of the Clerk of the Superior Court; Clerk of the Recorder's Court; County Account; County Treasurer; Sheriff's Settlement; Board of Education; Register of Deeds and Delinquent Tax Collectors.

Two members of the Negro School Committee presented requests for cer-

tain improvement to the school grounds. Haywood Martin was appointed by the Board of Education as a member of the Negro School Committee.

A resolution was passed directing the principals to require birth certificates of all children entering school in the first grade.

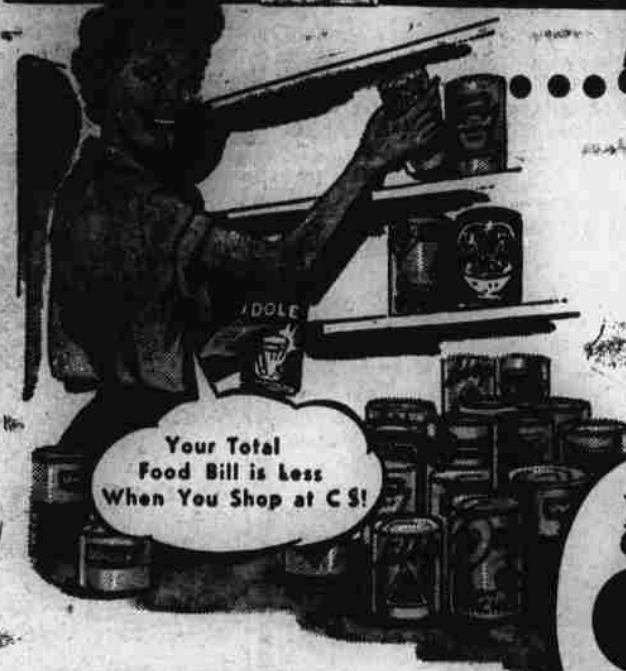
After much discussion with respect to the school lunchrooms a motion was made, seconded and passed setting forth the following policy with respect to free lunches. In order to receive free lunches a written request must be presented to the principal by the parents of the one requesting the lunches and this request will be reviewed by a committee representing

the school committee, teachers, and the Welfare Department.

Motion was made, seconded and passed directing that the Junior-Senior banquets be held at the school and that attendance be limited to Juniors and Seniors only.

After much time was spent discussing the safety of pupils while at school, the following resolution was passed. The Board of Education recommends that the High School Committee consider the question of requiring all high school pupils to remain on the school grounds from the time they arrive at school to the close of school, and the faculty members remains at school from 8:20 to 8:30.
