

School Bus Safety Program Inaugurated

A new school bus safety program was inaugurated yesterday by Sgt. Logan B. Lane of the State Highway Patrol in the seven counties of the Albemarle, Pasquotank, Camden, Currituck, Chowan, Perquimans, Dare and Gates.

Under the new program a highway patrolman will ride a school bus daily to observe the driver of that particular bus, the conduct of the children, and to check on law observance by motorists who may pass buses in traffic. A mile or so to the rear of the school bus will be a patrol car, driver of which will be in radio-telephone communication with the patrolman in the bus. Should there be a traffic violation by a passing motorist, the driver of the patrol car to the rear will be so notified and will speed to the scene to apprehend the law violator and take him in custody.

The motorist approaching a school bus will never know but that a patrolman will be on that particular bus.

Said Sgt. Lane: "We are not out primarily to catch
