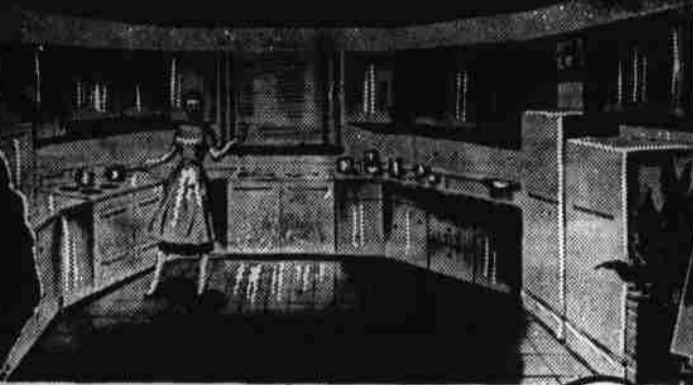

HOW TO BAKE A PICNIC
Bake, rind side up, on a rack in a shallow open pan in a slow oven, 225 degrees. No water. No cover. Cook a 4 to 5 pound picnic 2 1/2 to 3 hours; a 6 to 8 pound picnic 3 1/2 hours. To glaze, remove rind, cover with brown sugar; bake in hot oven, 400 degrees, 15 minutes.
HOW TO CARVE A PICNIC
1. Stand picnic on edge as shown.
2. Cut slices from A to base B.
3. Cut along base B to C to loosen slices.
4. Carve other slices as diagrammed.
