 1-2/3 cups (1 tall can) 1/2 teaspoon ginger
 1/2 cup evaporated milk 1/4 teaspoon powdered cloves
 2/4 cup sugar 1 No. 200 van grounds
 1/3 teaspoon salt 1 9-inch unshaded pastry shell
 Beat eggs slightly. Add other ingredients; mix well. Pour into pastry shell. Bake in hot oven, 425 degrees, 15 minutes. Reduce heat to moderate, 350 degrees, and continue baking 45 minutes or until a knife inserted in center comes out clean. Serve warm with whipped cream. Makes 1 9-inch pie.
