

A Fine Record

Our congratulations this week to J. W. Nowell and his group of forest fire rangers, who through the forest fire prevention service, established a fine record in Perquimans County in 1952.

This record revealed the county had only 11 forest fires during the year and loss was held to a minimum of \$539.

With timberland being one of our chief resources we hope the record of this department can and will be maintained in keeping losses at a low figure.

We also urge the public to continue their cooperation with this program by securing burning permits before starting brush fires, or burning over lands near woodlands. Public cooperation with the fire rangers will assure a continuation of this fine record.

Smith on U. S. Spies

General Walter Bedell Smith, the retiring chief of the Central Intelligence Agency, recently said the U. S. Intelligence Service was as good as any in the world, with the exception of that of the Soviet Union.

If General Smith's analysis is an accurate one, it represents quite an achievement, since the United States did not maintain any sizeable espionage system before World War II. The Soviet Union's espionage system has been functioning for many years and the beginning of the Communist system in the United States took place many decades ago.

General Smith believes the Soviet advantage lies mainly in the fact that information is easily obtained in the United States, whereas U. S. spies have a difficult time inside the Iron Curtain gaining access to restricted information.

General Smith estimated that, in a few years, the U. S. Intelligence Service would be the best in the world, partly because the C. I. A. is now developing a corps of career officers, which will provide the agency with fully and properly trained personnel for the first time. One interesting note in General Smith's remarks was the statement that the U. S. did not bank too heavily on international espionage. He called this "the least productive of sources."

Most intelligence work, Smith asserted, is a process of painstaking checking and detailed appraisals. Much of this careful analytical work is "actually drudgery," according to the retiring chief.

Good News For the Housewife

A tremendous supply of beef is moving through wholesale markets and processing plants to stores at present and the price paid for much of this beef, on the hoof, was the lowest since 1949. In late January, Chicago packers were paying an average of only \$25.00 a hundred pounds for steers. Only two months ago, prices averaged \$32 a hundred pounds, and, in January, 1952, the price was an average of \$34.25.

While the retail market has not reflected lower on-the-hoof prices for some time the long decline was finally realized in late January when a sharp wave of price-cutting swept in the country's retail meat markets. In Chicago, packers expect the present trend to continue a while longer and, thus, the prices of retail cuts of beef may continue to go down for a time.

As has been pointed out by many experts, appraising the job facing the new Administration, declining beef prices, and other farm prices, pose the Administration of President Eisenhower with a serious problem. However, the declining prices are good news to the housewife, who has been paying abnormally high prices for good cuts of beef in recent years. The housewife is also benefiting by decreases in lamb prices in most sections of the country.

Some of the leading packers have been selling premium lamb leg at 59c a pound, compared to a price of \$1 a pound only a few months ago. Poultry prices have also dropped. Thus, the best outlook for the housewife is brighter than it has been in years.
