### "Make Your Ironing Easier" BY KIMSEY PERRY Home Agent

The monthly demonstration for the January Home Demonstration Club meetings was "Make Your Ironing Easier". Most people do not have a utility room in their home; therefore, they have to put up their ironing board, each time they iron. It is much easier to push than to lift, and it is much less tiresome to sit and iron than to stand. An adjustable ironing board with rollers was demonstrated. Covers and pads may be made at home from old sheets and blankets. Caution should be taken not to have a crease or a seam in either.

A cordhinder is a small item that helps the disposition when one is ironing. It is irritating to have the cord hang over the corner of the board or to hang in something already ironed and wrinkle it. A sleeve board is something that makes ironing easier, that can be made at home. Press mats and ham cushions may also be made at home. A piece of plywood 50x20x 1/4 inches padded and covered, placed over the ironing board makes ironing pillow cases, sheets, curtains, napkins, and shirts much easier. This is wide enough for a shirt to be ironed without too much turning and wrinkling. A new method for ironing shirts quicker and easier was demonstrated.

Many wrinkles can be avoided if clothes are folded as they are removed from the line. Sprinkle with warm water and fold clothes instead of bunching them, to prevent wrinkles. Place in a plastic bag to prevent drying in spots and around edges. If they are sprinkled for a few hours before ironing, they will iron much quicker and there will be a smoother surface.

Where you iron will depend on the space available. Be sure you are not in a path of travel through the house, have good light and good ventilation and be cool in summer and warm in winter. Have everything you need within reach when you are ironing so you will not be stooping and stretching unnecessarily. Ironing is one of the most tiresome tasks in the home but it can be made easier.
