helps the disposition when one is ironing. It is irritating to have the cord hang over the corner of the board or to hang in something already iron-ed and wrinkle it. 'A sleeve board is something that makes ironing easier, that can be made at home. Press mits and ham cushions may also be made at home. A piece of plywood 50x20x%-inches padded and covered, placed over the ironing board makes ironing pillow cases, sheets, curtains, napkins, and shirts much easier. This is wide enough for a shirt to be ironed without too much turning and wrinkling. A new method for ironing shirts quicker and easier was demonstrated.

Many wrinkles can be avoided if Many wrinkles can be avoided if clothes are folded as they are removed from the line. Sprinkle with warm water and fold clothes instead of bunching them, to prevent wrinkles. Place in a plastic bag to prevent drying in spots and around edges. If they are sprinkled for a few hours before ironing, they will iron much fore ironing, they will iron much quicker and there will be a smoother

Where you iron will depend on the space available. Be sure you are not in a path of travel through the house, have good light and good ventilation and be cool in summer and warm in winter. Have everything you need within reach when you are ironing so you will not be stooping and stretching unnecessarily. Ironing is one of the most tiresome tasks in the home but it can be made easier.
