The Board further ordered that a two week quarantine on all dogs be started June 1st, during which time all dogs incret be continue on the own, er's premises. Dogs found straying during this period will be subject to being decreased as well as all dogs. being destroyed, as well as all dogs not wearing vaccination tags.

It is generally recognized that the control of rabies goes hand in hand with the control of the stray dog. While no rabies in our Health District has recently been reported, we all know that the time is ripe for its oc-curence. One stray dog can spread
