Vets Must Attend School To Receive Allowance Checks

Veterans attending school under the Korean GI Bill will not receive GI allowance checks for the months when they are out of school on summer vacations. Veterans who are enrolled for the entire school year will be paid, however, during the breaks (such as Christmas and Easter holidays) that take place from time to time during the school year, Veterans Administra-

tion said.

The types of breaks in training for which allowances will be paid are:

1. Regularly-established recesses between terms, quarters or semesters.
2. Regular school vacation periods that occur during the school year—but these do not include the summer vacation when a veteran is not in class.

VA said two provisions have to be met before a veteran-trainee may receive his allowance for reasons and vacation periods:

First, the school must be operating on a regular semester or quarter basis, and must certify on the veteran's enrollment certificate that he has been enrolled for the full year. And second, the veteran actually must have resumed his training after the between-terms break.

Vets' Question Box

Q—My wife and I are both World War II veterans. Is it possible for us to combine our GI loan benefits to buy a house?

A—Yes. However, the total amount that VA will guarantee is 60 per cent of the loan. Also, the maximum guaranty may not exceed \$15,000—which represents the combined maximum guarantees you and your wife should be entitled to, individually.

Q—I want to buy a house with a GI loan. Can you tell me why it's necessary to have the house appraised by VA?

A—The law requires that the purchase price of your house must not be more than the reasonable value, as determined by proper appraisal made by an appraiser designated by VA.

NANCY CARTER'S RECIPES

Dixie Manor Salad Bowl

1 small head crisp lettuce
1 clove garlic
4 radishes
3 green onions
1 medium sliced tomato
1 medium sliced carrot
1 avocado
12 to 16 cooked, drained

1/2 cup salad oil
1 1/2 tablespoon vinegar
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
1/2 teaspoon black pepper

Break lettuce into a bowl that has been rubbed with the cut clove of garlic. Cut radishes and onions into thin slices and mix with lettuce. Slice tomato; cut peeled carrot into very thin strips. Peel and slice avocado. Arrange tomato, carrots, avocado and asparagus in groups on top of greens. Put remaining ingredients into bowl and toss well. Pour over chilled salad. Serve at once. Makes 6 to 8 servings.
