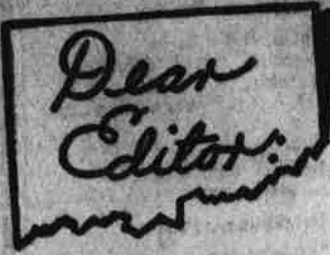


**BELVIDERE NEWS**
