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### Perquimans County Voters Approve **Bond Issue For Schools and Hospitals**

Balloting Very Light In All Precincts In This County

Perquimans County voters, joining with others throughout the State last Saturday, overwhelmingly approved the issuance of State bonds for construction of schools and mental hospitals.

pitals.
On the proposal for issuing \$50 millions in bonds for schools, county voters approved by a vote of 528 for and 28 against; the vote on bonds for hispitals was 519 for and 16 against.
While the total vote was light, only about 25 per cent of the eligible voters participated in the referendum in Perquimans County, proponents for the bond proposals were highly pleased at the margin the issues were approved.
