The heifer that is to be awarded December 16, is bred to a National Grand Champion, valued at \$35,000. The calf from this union will be another Perquimans County 4-H or F.F.A. younth, to be selected by a committee named to promote the calf chain.

About two years ago the Hertford Rotary Club adopted a calf chain project which has achieved much interest in the county but the change being made to registered animals, with the cooperation of the Perquimans Purebred Cattleman's Association, of which Commander Tim Brinn is president, is expected to promote a real cattle industry within the county.

Farmers and businessmen of Per-quimans County have been invited to attend the presentation of this Reg-istered Polled Hereford, which will be held at Perquimans High School at 1:30 o'clock next Wednesday after-noon. The program will be highlight-ed by Senator Alton A. Lennon, who will present awards to high-scoring livestock judging boys.

N. C. State College. The committee which will select the youth to receive the next calf, in August, 1954, is composed of the presi-dents of the four Ruritan Clubs of the county, the chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, the presi-dent of the Purebred Cattleman's As-sociation and the president of the Hert-ford Rotary Club.


