The Council's yuletide ledger shows a loss of 740 lives, from all accidents, during the Christmas holidays last year—and the toll of 555 dives in tage lic was the highest on record.

eason is the most hazardous single period of the year, according to Coun-ril statistics. In traffic accidents alone, twice as many persons are killed during a Christmas holiday period is on the same days of the preceding
