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### N. Elton Aydlett Of Elizabeth City Candidate For State Senate Seat

#### Elizabeth City Mayor Is First to Announce Candidacy

N. Elton Aydlett of Elizabeth City this week announced that he will be a candidate for State Senator for the First Senatorial District in the Demo-cratic primary election to be held in May. The two Senators for the dis-trict are A. P. Godwin of Gatesville and J. William Copeland of Murfrees-

In making his announcement as candidate Mr. Aydlett said:

"It is my sincere purpose and desire to represent the people of this entire district in the next General Assembly of North Carolina to the best of my ability. With 25 years' experience in public affairs, I feel that I am qualified to do so."

Mr. Aydlett was born at Harbinger in Currituck County October 25, 1902, and received his high school education at Poplar Branch. He entered the University of North Carolina in 1921, graduating with an L.L.B. degree in 1926, and was admitted to the Bar of North Carolina the same year. He was associated with Judge Walter L. Small in the practice of law until Judge Small's appointment to the Superior Court Bench in 1928. He mar-ried the former Pantha Houser of Rutherford and has one child, Patricia Ann. who is a graduate of the Uni-Ann, who is a graduate of the Uni-

#### Commissioners To Attend Public Hearing At Raleigh Feb. 24

Commissioners for the Town of Hertford, meeting in regular session here last Monday night, went on record opposing a petition, presented to the State Utilities Commission by the Virginia Electric and Power Company, in which the company seeks an increase in rates for electric power served all consumers.

In placing the matter before the Town Board Mayor V. N. Darden advised the commissioners investigation had revealed the Town of Hertford will pay out an additional five to six thousand dollars yearly for electric power if the VEP request for higher rates is granted by the State Commis-

It was also reported, individual customers of the VEP Company will be affected by any rate increase if granted the utility company.

Members of the Town Board, along with Town Attorney Chas. E. Johnson, and Town Supervisor F. T. Britt, will attend a public hearing on the matter, to be conducted in Raleigh on February 24 by the State Utilities

According to Mayor Darden, the Virginia Electric and Power Company recently was granted a rate increase in the State of Virginia, and the company is now seeking a similar rate increase within the State of North Carolina. The rate requested by the company, it was reported is about 15 per cent higher than the present rate pay for power by the Town of Hertford.
