You remember we reached Las Vegas, Nevada on December 19th, 1953, at 4:30 P. M. The first thing to do was to find rooms for the night in one of the many Hotel Courts, get dinner (supper to me) and then see this town of 25,000 people. I expected a lot of excitement in this big gambling center, but not so. Everything was as quiet and orderly as in a country town. Gambling is legalized by the State and is well policed. In Las Vegas there are many city blocks, on the main thoroughfare entirely occupied by gambling houses, just as we have stores out here. The State collects a tax of 2 per cent on the "winning" of each establishment or hotel and Ed Sullivan says it's impossible to get in a hotel or out without passing through the gambling area. And Sullivan says it makes Monte Carlo look like a gum machine operation. The hotels engage the most popular movie stars, to put on a good show, as an added attraction in order to encourage patrons of the numberless gambling machines—from 5c on up to Sullivan says the streets were beautifully decorated for Christmas—exceeded only by Hollywood Boulevard in California. We didn't lose any money in Las Vegas. We left early on the morning of the 20th. Moving our watches up 1 hour, new time 7 o'clock, on our way out of the city I counted 65 motor courts before reaching the desert. I forgot to tell you that the "Golden Nugget" gambling hall was advertised 1,000 miles east of Las Vegas. We are now near the California State line, and reach it at 7:45. More desert and cactus, sage grass and mountains on either side of the highway. A beautiful day for traveling. Mountain Pass, Paso. Alto-Hobo Station 8:45. A lot of wasteland. El-Rancho 9:55, a regular network of electric power lines from Boulder Dam. Police inspection of cars and contents at 10:00. Barstow 10:10, Helendale 10:45, Victorville at 11:00, Summit's Inn, population 4,000, 11:20. San Bernando 11:45 and lunch here. Green trees and palms also orange groves. Let's eat!
