Growth Of HD Club Work In County Is Shown By Report

Home Demonstration work has been carried on a number of years in Perquimans County. During World War I Miss Helen Gaitner carried on the work on a small scale. Canning and preserving of foods were the main projects in those days. Then for a period of time there was no Home Demonstration work in Perquimans.

In the early thirties a group of women went before the Board of County Commissioners to ask for a Home Demonstration Agent for Perquimans County. At this time, the request was not granted. However, a year later, it was approved.

The first Home Agent was Miss Gladys Hamrick who came from Kings Mountain. Mrs. M. T. Griffin was first County President; she is now a member of Hopewell Club. At that time there were two clubs, Belvidere and Bethel, with approximately 25 to 30 members. New Hope Club was the third club organized. 4-H Clubs were soon organized for girls and boys and the work went forward under Miss Hamrick's leadership.

In the early forties, Miss Hamrick resigned because of ill health of her father and went to work near her home to be with her father.

Miss Frances Maness of Bules Creek came to Perquimans following Miss Hamrick. For a number of years, Miss Maness worked with the 4-H Club members to develop, strengthen, and cultivate the work of the Home Demonstration Club in their effort in conservation of life and in promoting higher standards of living in the home and community in such fields as health, safety, citizenship, international relations, and education. During World War II a curb market was sponsored where women took their products. The service men's wives as well as other women were glad to buy these products and the club members were glad to have a little extra money to spend.

In the fall, we had a county fair with each club having a project. Refinished furniture and live at home were two projects that won blue ribbons at the fair, while the County Council members took turns serving at the hot dog stand.

In 1948, Miss Maness resigned to accept a position as Home Economist with an electrical appliance company. Miss Nina Braswell, from Jackson, came to Perquimans as Home Agent in June of 1948. Miss Braswell was married to Emory White in May of the next year. Under Mrs. White's leadership, the clubs progressed rapidly. A county chorus was organized and received many honors. A county exhibit in the State Fair at Raleigh was very good. 4-H leader work and 4-H club programs were carried forward under the leadership of Miss Lillian Swinson, Assistant Home Agent at that time. In May of 1951 Mrs. White resigned to become a housewife and Miss Kimsey Perry, who was the Assistant at the time, took over as

Home Agent.
Miss Perry, who was already familiar with the county, carried the work on with no trouble whatsoever. Under her leadership, club work progressed rapidly. The women worked hard on all phases of homemaking and hardly ever were they asked to do something that they refused. The chorus was going along very well, and they were being asked to sing at a number of different occasions. Among these were the Jaycee Minstrels and the District Meeting at Edenton.

At this time club work is still being carried on rapidly and progressively under the leadership of Miss Perry. 4-H Club work is being directed by Miss Clara Mason, who came to Perquimans County as Assistant Home Agent in March, from East Carolina College. Miss Mason is doing a very good job and has gotten to know quite a few people in the short time she has been here.

The development of club work throughout Perquimans County, over the past year, is one in which those having a part can well be proud of the continuous growth and expansion as National Home Demonstration Week is being observed.
