Vets' Question Box

Q-I am a World War II veteran training under the original GI Bill. Next month I expect to finish my course. Since I have some entitlement remaining, would I be allowed to enroll in another course in a different field?

A-No. Once you complete or dis-continue a course under the World War II GI Bill, you generally are prohibited from taking another course, even though you do have additional entitlement

Q-If I simply send an application for Korean GI term insurance to VA within the 120-day deadline, will I be able to get the insurance? I'd like to pay my first premium at a later date, if possible.

A-An application alone, submitted within the 120-day period, would not be enough to entitle you to Korean GI term insurance. You also must pay your first premium within the 120 days.

N. C. SOYBEAN CROP IS 25 PERCENT ABOVE LAST YEAR

The North Carolina soybean crop is forecast at 4,769,000 bushels as of October 1. This is an increase of 25 per cent over the 1958 crop of 3.814,-000 bushels. A crop of 4,769,000 bush-els would be the largest crop since 1951 when production totaled 5,098,-000 bushels.

On the basis of reports made by growers to the North Carolina Crop Reporting Service, the yield pur acro is forecast at 16.5 busiels. This arceeds the 1953 average yield by two bushels and equals the record yields of 16.5 bushels set in 1951 and 1952.
