New Weather Forecaster

Trans-World Airlines announced recently that its Meteorology department had worked out a new method of predicting weather conditions. A TWA official said the new method allowed the airline to predict weather conditions five to seven days in advance.

E. D. Farthing, assistant manager of meteorology for TWA, recently presented a paper to the Kansas City Seminar of the American Meteorological Society on the new weather forecasting system. He said it had been found that rays emitted by the sun's corona gave many clues as to the weather, and weather in immediate days to come. The system is supposed to have been developed after several years of study and involves the color of rays from the sun's corona.

It has been found that when intense green emissions are visible from the sun's corona heavy rains often occur. On the other hand, when red emissions are visible, dry weather is more likely, and when there is a lack of color, the weather is usually normal for the time of year.

TWA officials report that, by using the new system, they have been able to gain valuable information for flight scheduling and cite examples of their various runs to prove the significance of this aid. The evidence appears most conclusive, and it seems that a new and significant development in the ageless art of weather forecasting has been uncovered.

Open Season On Managers

It appears to be open season on major league baseball managers, and two more have fallen by the wayside in recent weeks. They are Terry Moore, of the Philadelphia Phillies, and Lou Boudreau of the Boston Red Sox.

The turnover in major league managers has been tremendous this year, and already in the American League, Baltimore, Detroit, Washington, Chicago, Boston and possibly, Philadelphia, are to have new managers. If the Athletics have a different manager, that will mean New York and the pennant-winning Cleveland Indians will be the only two teams in the league not to have experienced managerial changes.

Such a turnover in one league has not been seen in many years. The fast pace of changes brings to mind the problem of a manager's future. This question has arisen on many occasions recently, especially when managers sought contracts, which extended over more than one year, as a measure of security.

Major league clubs, however, are reluctant to hire a manager for many years at a stretch, since anything can happen during the year and a manager can lose his effectiveness or the club can be a flop and have a miserable year, necessitating a change to improve both the box office and field records of the club.

Russian Policy Changing

There are increasing indications that Moscow's policy is changing to a more reasonable one. We do not infer that Moscow has changed its goal or its traditional opposition to United States policies, but it seems clear that the Soviet Union is making an all-out effort to change its policies as they affect countries in the Far East, in the Balkans and in Europe.

The recent Soviet agreement with China, in which the Soviet Union made major concessions, promised to withdraw from Port Arthur and abandon its joint ownership of stock companies designed to exploit Chinese resources, is one point to be mentioned. In addition, the Soviet Government has reversed itself on the Trieste problem and recently informed the United Nations that it approved of the Trieste settlement, which was arranged by the United States and Great Britain.

Moreover, the Soviet Union has indicated it would go along with the Canadian proposal for world armament control. The Soviet Union says it wishes minor changes in the proposal, but for the first time, it has indicated substantial agreement with a Western-proposed system of international armament control.

The Russians have also broken up joint stock companies, in which Rus-

ian ownership was considerable in both Bulgaria and Rumania.

In addition to these moves, and others, the Russians now say they are ready to talk about the unification of Germany. This last effort, concerning Germany, is considered propaganda by most Westerners—who think the Russians are talking German unification only to stall the rearmament of West Germany. There are some, however, who think the Russians might be willing to consider German unification, and real sovereignty, if progress in such a direction could block alliance of West Germany with the democracies.
