

The vote in North Carolina will be added to those of other cotton states. Unless the quota issue carries overall by two-thirds majority, price supports of 90 per cent erate and to levy taxes. of parity will drop to only 50 per cent of parity. Preliminary returns from seven other participating states indicated a margin of 93 per cent in favor of the quotas.
