





SOIL CONSERVATION NOTES

Es I. Miller has recently contructed a ditch on the back side of his farm to prevent woods water rom entering his fields. He plans to revise the drainage system on this farm by cutting four new paradlel ditches and filling up the present ditches. His new ditches will run the entire length of the farm, making the rows approximately twice as long as they are now and will eliminate all short rows except on one side of one cut.

T. C. Whitehurst plans to grow ome food for quail this year. Mr. Whitehurst, on his farm near Chapmoke, has one small field that is located some distance from his other fields. This field contains approximately 11/2 acres and is surrounded by woods. Due to its size and location Mr. Whitehurst decided to use this field to produce food for quail. He plans to set a border of bicolor lespedeza plants around the edge of the field and o seed the main part of the field o annual seed mixtures. The North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission will furnish the bicolor plants and the annual seed mix-
