SAYS**



Washington—The Senate took recess for the Fourth of July. I took advantage of the recess to visit Dare County, North Carolina. This visit, which lasted parts of three days, constituted the only vacation I have had since I became a member of the Senate about one year ago.

While I lodged at Nags Head, I took advantage of opportunities to visit Kitty Hawk, Manteo, Hatteras and Cape Hatteras.

"The Lost Colony"
I was much impressed by the excellence of the performance of those who enacted Paul Green's celebrated play, "The Lost Colony," which depicts with such a high degree of accuracy the courage of America's first settlers. It is well-nigh impossible for us to comprehend the choice our first settlers made when they forsook the comparative security of the Old World for the terrifying insecurity of the New. It was not without many pangs of regret that they turned their backs for all time upon the scenes of their childhood, the graves of their beloved dead, the comparative security of the then civilized world, and journeyed in tiny barks across a boisterous ocean to establish homes for themselves and their children, and their children's children in what was then a perilous wilderness in a new and strange land.

The Outer Banks
My first visit to Dare County occurred in May, 1951, when my long-time friend, R. Floyd Crouse, a colleague in the General Assembly of 1951, and I journeyed from Raleigh to Manteo. I have never seen greater changes in any section than those which have occurred on this portion of the Outer Banks of North Carolina since that time. This portion of the Outer Banks has become one of the great recreation centers of the nation. It is certain to undergo even greater development in the future for its potentialities beggar one's imagination.

Other Sections
Since I became one of North Carolina's Senators, I have availed myself of every opportunity to visit various sections of the State. I believe that this is the best way for a public official to ascertain the problems of the people he is privileged to serve. I hope to see many other sections of the State after the adjournment of the present session of the Congress, which we now believe will occur sometime about the end of July.

My visits to the Outer Banks and the coastal regions of North Carolina have convinced me that these

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**College Tarheels...
AN INCREASING NUMBER!**

Although it has not reached the peak post-war year of 1947-48, total college enrollment in North Carolina is now increasing each year. The enrollment of all the colleges and universities of the State, during the school year just ended, was 45,258—or 9.7 per cent higher than the year before. Development Program.
In the referendum wool growers will have an opportunity to vote for or against putting into effect an agreement recently made between the Secretary of Agriculture and the American Sheep Producers Council under Section 708 of the National Wool Act of 1954. This agreement provides for deductions from wool incentive and lamb and yearling sheep (pulled wool compensating) payments made to producers under the National Wool Act of 1954. These deductions will provide for advertising, and other promotional activities to enlarge and improve the market for wool and lambs. Before the agreement can be put in effect, producers owning at least two-thirds of the sheep and lambs represented by those voting in the referendum

must vote their approval. Producers who have owned sheep 6 months of age or older, for at least 30 days since January 1, 1955, will be eligible to vote. Volume of production will be based on the number of sheep 6 months of age or older owned for at least 30 days since the January 1 date. The number of sheep will be noted on the ballot.

If the referendum is approved, deduction from payments of the 1955 incentive program to be made the summer of 1956 will be one cent per pound from wool payments, and the rate of 5 cents per one hundred pounds liveweight from lamb and yearling payments. Perquimans County ASC Office has mailed ballots to all known wool producers in the county and Chairman Lane assures any producer who does not receive a ballot that he can get one by writing or calling at the ASC County Office. Chairman Lane said all ballots must be returned to the ASC Office not later than August 19th. Since the results of the referendum will be based on the number of

sheep represented by the growers, the outcome of the referendum will not be available until about September 1st.

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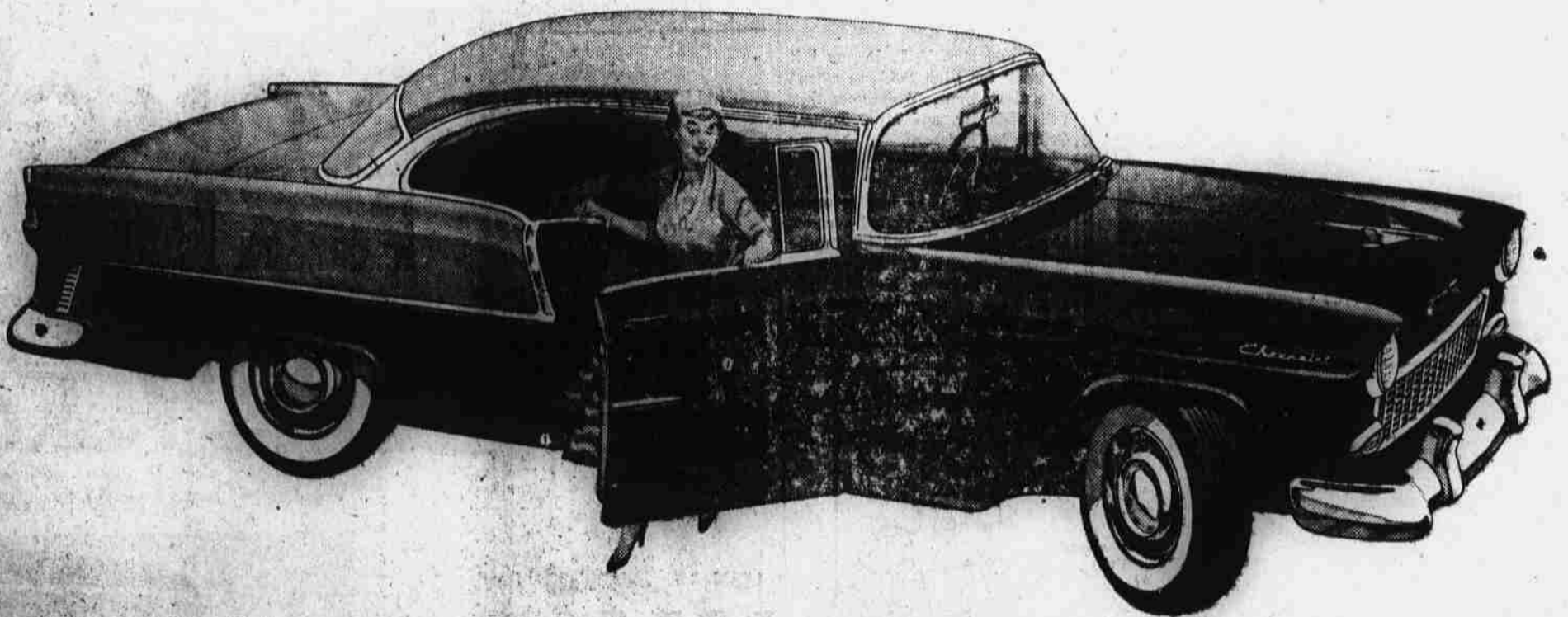
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
