

Peanut Prospects Slightly Lower

The 1954 peanut crop for picking and threshing is estimated at 269,000,000 pounds as of November 1, according to the North Carolina Crop Reporting Service. This is 3 per cent below the October 1 forecast, although 3 per cent above the production for the drought-stricken year 1954.

Current prospects indicate a yield of 1,425 pounds per acre. This compares with 1,465 pounds last year and 1,190 pounds for the ten-year (1944-53) average yield.

Most of the crop has been dug and stacked after some delay from wet ground during early October. Picking and threshing is now under way and reports indicate that only a small per cent of the crop has been picked to date.

House Damaged By Fire On Tuesday

A two-story house occupied by John Shannonhouse on Brace Avenue, was badly damaged by fire last Tuesday morning. Firemen were called to fight the blaze at 11:15 and about 40 minutes were required to bring the fire under control. The fire, it was reported, of undetermined origin, started on the second floor of the house, which was a total loss and some damage resulted to the first floor.
