

### News Report From Washington

**Hall On Ike—  
The Draft Is Shaping  
Another Geneva Go—  
Business In 1956—**

Washington — Republican Chairman Leonard Hall has made the most optimistic prediction concerning President Eisenhower's plans for 1956 yet made by a high Republican official. And since Hall is the highest Republican party official after the President, his statement should have been significant.

Curiously, however, the Hall statement, made on one of the last days of November, created little excitement in the stock market. Observers still believe if the President suddenly announced he was running again in 1956, business confidence would increase and the stock market reflect this immediately. But Hall's statement was followed by a day of declining stock market prices.

Hall's statement is not the only encouragement for Ike's backers. There are authoritative reports that a group of highly influential Republican leaders, including Cabinet members, are preparing a draft to get Ike to run again. And if Mr. Eisenhower's recovery continues as it has been doing, he may find it almost impossible to turn such a draft down.

The reason why he could not easily turn such a plea aside is the fact that it lay squarely on the Chief Executive that he alone can save the Republican party from being placed in a disadvantageous position in 1956 elections. It will point out, among other things, the Eisenhower Administration farm policy has not produced satisfactory results as yet.

A new approach will be proposed in January, to solve the farm dilemma, but whether the Democratic-controlled 84th Congress will pass this proposal is highly problematical. If the Democrats restore parity per cent of parity, and junk the Republican farm proposals, it may be that only Ike, of all the Republican candidates, could carry the elephant through to victory at the polls next year.

The President would be asked to base his decision on his own condition, of course, but many highly-placed Republicans believe his recovery so far is a positive indication that he will be able to run again in 1956.

The Administration is going through with plans to cooperate toward staging another Big Four meeting in Geneva next spring. The official line is that the meet-

ings are no success but that it is better to meet and talk to the Russians, rather than carry on the cold war while not having any contact with them.

And the different part of the approach, as far as the Eisenhower wing of the party is concerned, is that the United States did not lose in the last Geneva meeting and does not necessarily stand to lose in meetings with the Communists, just because its diplomats sit down at the table with the Comms.

Business prospects for 1956 are good but no boom is expected and most economists do not think the rise next year will be as rapid as was the rise this year. The economists were fooled in 1954, as it (Continued on Page Eight)

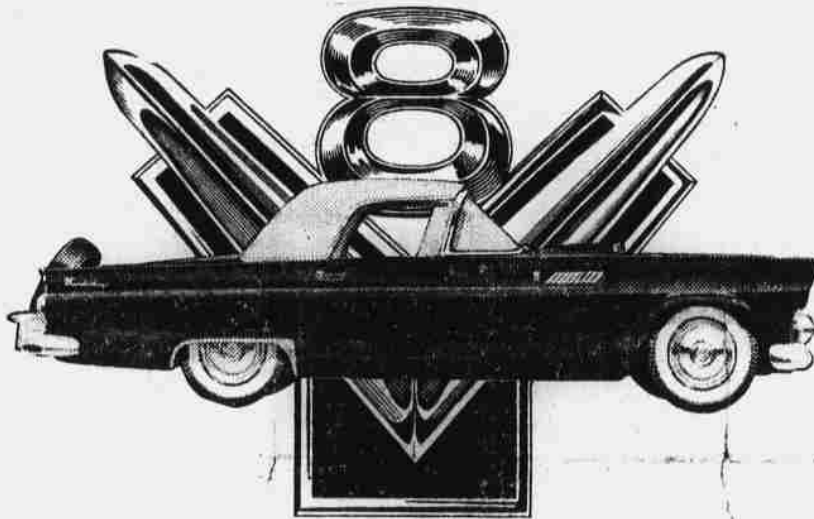

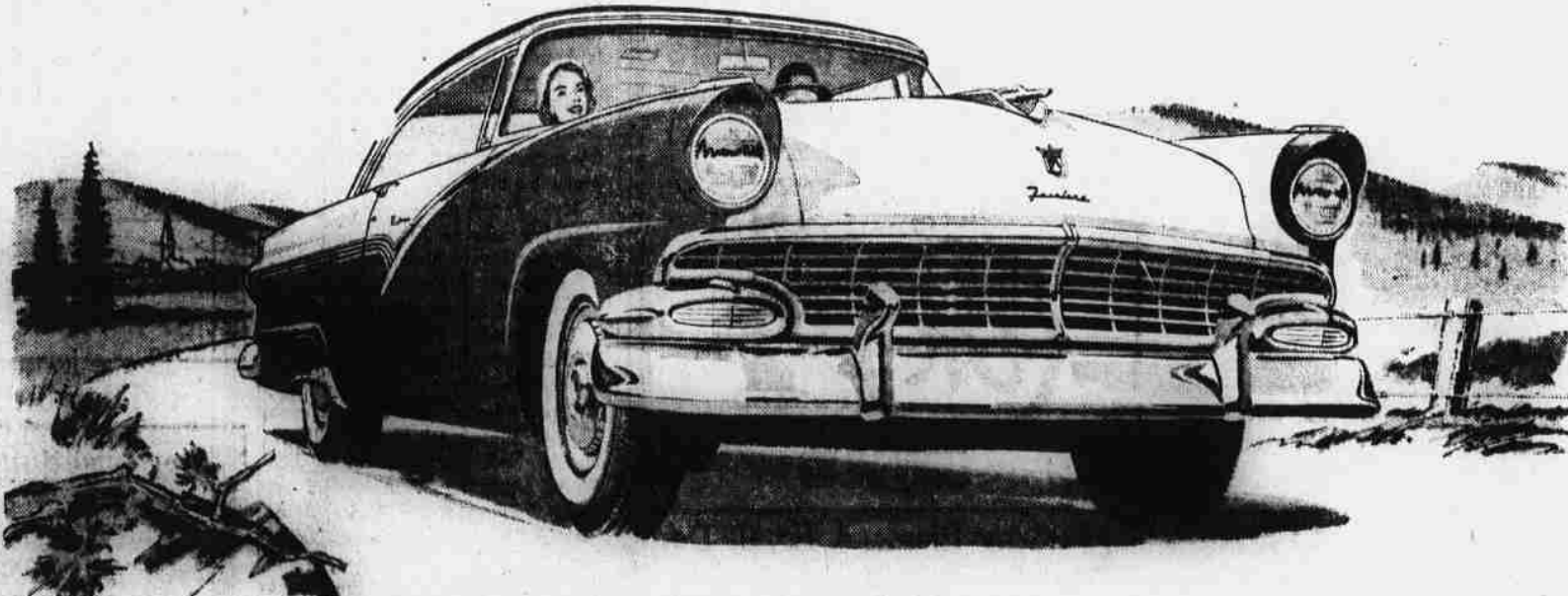

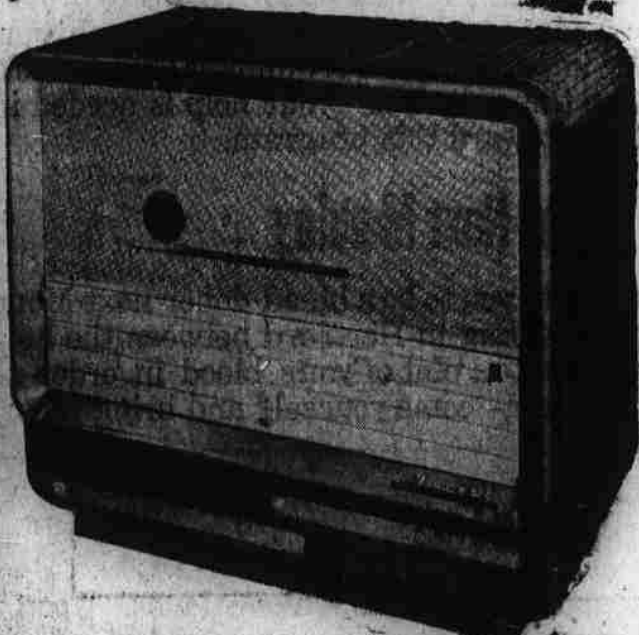
