Chairman Kendall points out that the General Assembly of North Carolina amended the law at its 1955 session, effective January 1, 1956, after the Congress of the United States had amended the Federal Unemployment Tax Act to extend its provisions to employers! of four or more workers. The N. C. amendment was enacted to conform to the federal law. In prior years both laws provided that only employers of eight or more workers were liable.

The State's Employment Security Commission, Chairman Kendall reports, is planning to make information available through various media to employers who may be subject to the law in the hope of eliminating any misunderstanding as to what firms are liable (covered) or when the first reports and tax payments are due. However, he stated, the failure of any employer to receive the information or other materials being distributed in no way relieves him of his liability
