County Applies For Funds To Complete Drainage Program

Perquimans County, through the Board of County Commissioners Dr. Carter Speaker acting to relieve stream drainage conditions resulting from hurricanes which struck this area last fall, has made application to State and Federal Civil Defense Authority for funds totaling \$188,414,00 to carry out a drainage program within the county, which will relieve the condition and expedite the flow of water through creeks and at Chowan High School Wednesday rivers of the county.

A bill appropriating the sum of six million dollars, for this program in some 30 counties in Northeastern North Carolina, has been given approval by the House and U. S. Senate.

The local program, worked up by the county department of Conservation headed by Soil Conservationist F. A. McGoogan, calls for clearing the creeks, swamps and rivers of life. at 15 locations in Perquimans.
