quimans County for the first nine months of the current fiscal year, which closed out last Saturday, are running slightly ahead of the budget as adopted by the Board of Commissioners last June, according to a financial report made to the Board, during its meeting this week by Max Campbell, County Account-

during the nine months period, exclusively of \$125,000 received from the sale of school bonds, amounted to \$250,413.81 while expenditures vere \$220,577.55. Cash balances on hand at the close of the period, not inclusive of school capital outlay, amounted to \$99,140.42. A large payment for debt service, \$29,000. plus interest due on bands, is scheduled for payment May 1, and this outlay will further reduce the outstanding balances.

Of the \$132,000 levied as 1956 property taxes, \$113,515 has been collected up to this date.
