If it were not for a "minimum" provision in the law the national marketing quota would be 151. 000 tons less, or 675,000 tons. Legislation provides that the marketing quota must be equal to the average quantity of peanuts harvested for nuts during he five years immediately preeding the year in which the juota is proclaimed, adjusted or current trends and prospecive demands; but the quota nust be not less than a quantity ufficient to provide a national

In a referendum on December 1, 1956, Tar Heel peanut farmapproved marketing quotaon the crops to be produced in 957, 1958 and 1959 by a margin of 94.9%. Price support will be vailable to complying producers it a level between 75 and 90 er cent if parity in 1958 and 959 depending upon the supply it the beginning of the marketng year. Marketing quotas ave been in effect continuously or peanuts since 1949.
